NEW YORK, April 30.—(AP)—Irving Fisher, 80, professor emeritus of political economy at Yale University, died yesterday. Cause of death was not disclosed. At his bedside when he died was his son, Irving Norton Fisher.

Federal Financial Backing of Schools Draws Criticism

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—Amos A. Fries, director of "the Friends of the Public Schools of America," said today government financial support of schools would lead to "a federal bureaucracy or a private hierarchy of education."

His organization "believes absolutely that the public schools should be locally controlled and locally financed as a fixed principle," Fries said in a statement prepared for a Senate labor-public subcommittee.

Fries opposed legislation which would provide grants to the states for school purposes.

He said the nation's schools have "failed in a large way" to meet essential needs, and said one reason is that the national education association and other organizations have wasted much time and energy lobbying for federal aid.

"Let us not mollycoddle parents and children with the sop of an education without effort," he said. "Education without effort simply creates a horde of 'gimmies' those who look to

the government for everything whether they do anything to deserve it or not."

WALLA WALLA, April 29.—(AP)—Dr. Stephen B. L. Penrose,

blind president-emeritus of Whitman College, died today at his Walla Walla home after a prolonged illness. He was 82.
