West Faces Tough Senate Battle to Get More Money

WASHINGTON, May 1.—(AP)—The West was put on notice today by four of its members that attempts to restore reclamation and power funds to the Interior Department appropriation bill face tough going in the Senate.

Since the House whacked the total to \$161,538,333 or about 45 per cent under President Truman's recommendations, western members of Congress have looked hopefully to the Senate.

But Senators Cordon (R-Ore.) and Magnuson (D-Wash.) agreed today that the fight for more money in the Senate version of the bill would be easy.

"The Senate," Cordon told a reporter, "will follow the economy program started in the House. The Senate will try to adjust any injustices that may have crept into the bill, but the Senate is not going to make any general upward revision."

Magnuson said, "We are going to fight for all the increases we can get but the West must expect that some of the reductions will remain."

Senators Morse (R-Ore.) and Cain (R-Wash.) said that with-out convincing justifications for increases the western cause is in for tough sledding. They have been assembling detailed data to back up their requests for more funds.

The bill, as it passed the House, cut funds for the Reclamation Bureau from a recommended \$143,952,200 to \$67,717,600 and the Bonneville Power Administration from \$20,278,000 to \$6,907,800.

Senator Magnuson said he believes the Senate will produce enough opposition to the un-warranted cuts in the Interior Department bill to prevent its being acted upon in its present form.

Slow-Acting Nitrogen Fertilizer Developed

A slow-acting nitrogen fertilizer that feeds crops over a long growing period has been developed by soil scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The fertilizer is one of a series of combinations of urea and formaldehyde known as Uraform and since both chemicals are in short supply, it is produced at present only on a laboratory scale.

Unlike nitrogen fertilizers now used, Uraform does not leach out of the soil easily, and so offers promise of a source of nitrogen for corn, potatoes, and tobacco—crops which ordinarily need additional fertilizer after they have been planted. Uraform may be used in mixed fertilizer as well as in separate applications.

Four States Eye Phone Rates Hike Application

SALEM, Ore., April 30.—(AP)—Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg said a hearing probably would be held in Salem some time after June 15 on the proposed increased rates sought by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co.

Flagg said the hearing could not be held before that date because of a large amount of preliminary studies which must be made. He said California, Washington, Idaho and Oregon utilities commissioners are working together on the requested rate increase, which would amount to \$1,500,000 a year in Oregon.

Douglas High On Job Record List

SALEM, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—Employment in Oregon last December was the highest for any peace-time winter month in the state's history, and was only 10 per cent below the wartime peak in 1943, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission said.

There were 286,296 persons employed during December in jobs covered by the unemployment compensation law, which was 43.4 per cent above December, 1940.

But 23 of the 36 counties had employment in December which was even larger than during the war. These mostly were Western Oregon lumber counties, with Douglas, Josephine, Jackson,

Clackamas, Lane and Lincoln counties having the biggest gains. The 37 Western Oregon counties, excluding Multnomah County, had employment gains of 26.6 per cent since 1943, and 57.2 per cent greater than in 1940.

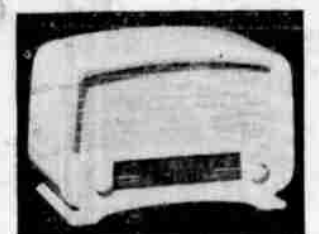

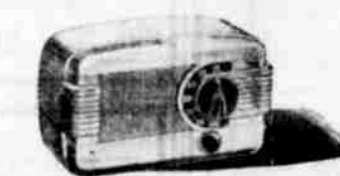

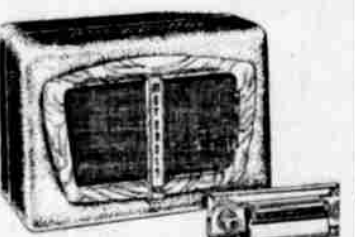
