WE get a similarly distorted
picture when we read the
crime stories. They are numer-
ous enough, the Lord knows.
Reading the papers, etc., in these
days, we sometimes wonder cyni-
cally if ANYBODY goes straight
any more.

WELL, maybe not. Still, we
mustn't forget that in this
modern day communications have
been perfected amazingly. If any-
body strays from the narrow
path, ever so little, in Bingville,
Arkansas, or Tallahassee, Flori-
da, or ANYWHERE, for that
matter, we know about it pronto
in every city and village in
America.

A century ago, communications
were scant and slow. There were
no radios. The newspapers of
that day couldn't afford to gath-
er news of every crime that hap-
pened anywhere.

In these days of almost un-
limited communications, the
crime story pours in on us in a
steady torrent.

WHILE we're about it, let's
philosophize a little more.

It is indubitably true that
crime and its recital promote
more crime. People with weak
minds read of crime and are
prompted to give it a try. But it
is also true that the fear of pub-
licity is a DETERRENT of crime.

That is to say, there are many
people who wouldn't mind stray-
ing from the narrow paths of vir-
tue if reasonably sure they
wouldn't be found out. It is be-
ing found out and having the
findings spread on the printed
page and sent vibrating out over
the air waves for all to hear that
is the rub.

We newspaper people know all
about that. When somebody's
foot slips, he hides himself to the
editor's office without delay to
see if it can't be kept out of the
paper. He is quite sure that if
his misdoing could be kept dark
everything would be hunky-dory
and the sun would continue to
shine in a blue and smiling sky.

ISN'T it just possible that with
communications what they are
in these days, with the likeli-
hood of having wrongdoing set
out for all to read and all to hear,
modern people may be a little
less likely to take a chance than
in the earlier days when publicity
was less searching and less effi-
cient?

At any rate, it is a thought. It
doesn't do us any good to hug to
our bosoms the delusion that all
the BAD is happening now
whereas all was GOOD and pure
and sweet in the olden, golden
days.

That leads to the conclusion
that the world is getting worse
instead of better, which is a
numbing thought.

Besides, in all probability, it
ISN'T TRUE.

Trout Catches Good
At Tahkenitch Lake

Tahkenitch Lake has been
yielding good catches of trout and
bass, according to H. W. Fowler,
resident owner. Eleven limit catches
of trout were landed at the
Tahkenitch resort dock Saturday,
opening day of trout season, and
nine limit catches were made
Sunday. Nearly all anglers caught
fish. Bass fishing has been fair.
"Bass fishing is being ruined
by weeds in the lake, and trout
fishing will be ruined within a
year by logging operations on
main streams entering the lake,"
Fowler asserts in discussing con-

REEDSPORT SEA SCOUTS

We had the extreme good fortune Tuesday night to be
a guest of the Reedsport Chamber of Commerce at that
organization's annual banquet where we received an intro-
duction to the Reedsport Sea Scouts, who presented one of
the most inspiring ritualistic openings we have ever seen
at a banquet program.

The high school gymnasium, where the banquet was held,
had been decorated by the Sea Scouts to resemble the deck
of a ship. A blue, star-studded canopy formed the "sky"
above the tables, extending over the entire gymnasium.
There was a mainmast and a foremast and between were
strung signal flags.

Called to assembly by the bugler, the Scouts "came
aboard" singly, each with proper salutes to colors and au-
thority, and took stations. Following the Sea Scout and Boy
Scout pledges, Colors were raised to the peak of the fore-
mast with accompanying bugle music, after which the
Scouts led the Pledge of Allegiance.

"The Skipper and his party" were then "piped" aboard
as Skipper Alden Leach advanced to the head table with
banquet dignitaries. Guests and friends followed.

It later developed that the Reedsport Sea Scouts were
presenting their opening ceremony in public for the first
time, but to spectators, and particularly those of us who
have had no previous contact with the Sea Scouts, it seemed
the participants had been conducting the ritual for years.

Reedsport has occasion to be particularly proud of its
Sea Scouts. The organization consists of 18 members, each
with extensive previous training with the Boy Scouts of
America.

The Reedsport troop has its own boat. The 30-foot vessel,
originally a whaler, was purchased by the U. S. Navy at the
outbreak of the late war and served during the period of
hostilities on coastal patrol. It was donated by the Navy to
the Reedsport Scouts. The boys spent approximately \$1,000
to remodel and recondition the boat, which can be used for
both bay and ocean travel. Lacking funds with which to
prepare the vessel for their use, the Scouts went into debt.
Within two years, through sponsorship of dances, social
events and various collective odd jobs, the boys, entirely
by their own efforts, have reduced the debt to slightly less
than \$300.

One of their money-raising events was Tuesday night's
seafood dinner. The Scouts dug clams for chowder, obtained
sufficient fresh crabs to feed approximately 200 people, and,
with the help of mothers, sisters and girl friends, prepared
and served the delicious meal.

Organized only three years, the Sea Scouts have become
one of the outstanding organizations of the community.
Members are training themselves not only for sea duty but
in community service as well.

Anyone observing the discipline, decorum, personality and
physical perfection of the members of the Reedsport troop
could not help but be envious of the opportunity these Scouts
have and of the community of which they are a part.

Lutherans Thanked
For Relief Given
German Families

Last fall, St. Paul's Lutheran
Church in Roseburg, and St.
John's Lutheran Church at Su-
therlin, through the Lutheran Re-
lief Committee, "adopted" two
needy families living in Germany.

The two congregations obli-
gated themselves to send pack-
ages of food and clothing through
the winter and spring months.
The two families have now been
heard from, said the Rev. W. A.
Sylvester, pastor of the two churches.

Several of the food and cloth-
ing packages have already been
received. Deep appreciation was
expressed by the two "adopted"
families for this assistance, the
Rev. Mr. Sylvester said.

One family stated it is allowed
only one liter (approximately one
quart) of skimmed milk per per-
son per month.

The two local congregations
plan to continue sending food and
clothing to their two adopted
families until conditions again
become normal and relief no
longer is needed.

In addition to food and cloth-
ing, contributions from the Lu-
theran congregations also par-
ticipate in the special war-relief
offering conducted by the Lu-
theran Church (Missouri Synod).
During the past year more than
\$2,000,000 was raised through this
special offering for relief of
physical and spiritual needs in
war-stricken areas of Europe and
Asia.

A special committee has been
appointed, with headquarters and
warehouses in St. Louis, Mo., to
direct this special war-relief work.

Damages of \$10,000 Asked
In Death of Youth

SUIT for \$10,000 damages
against Dr. H. B. Scofield, chiro-
practor, was filed in Circuit Court
this week, charging alleged
negligence in treating a neck in-
jury, which resulted in the death
of Eugene April 27, of 9-year-old
Donald Earl Hatfield of Camas
Valley.

The suit was filed by the boy's
father, Elmer L. Hatfield. His
complaint charges that Donald re-
ceived a neck injury while suffling
with school papers April 13.
He was taken to Dr. Scofield for
diagnosis and treatment. He was
in Dr. Scofield's care eight days,
the complaint recites.

The father charged his son's
death was due to "a lack of a de-
gree of knowledge and skill com-
monly possessed by members of
the defendant's profession."
