To us, democracy means a government that is designed to serve the welfare of the INDIVIDUAL. To achieve and retain such a government, we must insure the free participation of ALL parties in elections, with the final decision resting upon the expressed desires of the MAJORITY.

If you are to understand the situation, you MUST take this fact into consideration. If you really want to understand it, you'd better read Marx—for Marxism is the bible of the Russian communist state.

Reading Marx is a tough job. He is hard to understand, for he lacked the gift of putting his ideas in simple language that everybody can understand.

In that, he is like too many of our editorial writers, who really write for their fellow editors, rather than for the bulk of their subscribers. The result is that they shoot over the heads of those they ought to be trying to reach and inform.

ANYWAY, whether you read Marx or take it on the word of somebody else, you must understand that "democracy" means one thing to us and SOMETHING ENTIRELY DIFFERENT to Moscow.

HURRY TRI-STATE PACT

Legislation was enacted at the last session of the state legislature to halt commercial fishing with nets for salmon in the Umpqua River. But there is little opportunity for restoration of the critically depleted spring Chinook salmon run as long as offshore trawlers are permitted to continue their destructive practices.

The Port Umpqua Courier, published at Reedport, reports in its issue for May 1: One of the earliest runs of chinook in the history of Winchester Bay has brought a fleet of fishing vessels into the port from every section of the Pacific coast.

The weights reported by the Port Umpqua Courier indicate that the offshore trawlers are taking large numbers of immature salmon, which is one of the principal reasons that method of fishing is so destructive.

The last legislature passed a bill authorizing a compact between the states of Washington, Oregon and California to regulate the offshore fishery. At the same time a measure was passed granting rule-making authority to the state fish commission.

Salmon congregate just outside the bar at the Umpqua and other coastal rivers, and often remain several weeks working in and out of the bay prior to starting the upstream trek.

While salmon are heavily concentrated around the bays they fall easy prey to trawlers who operate just outside the bar, dragging their lures back and forth through the schools of fish.

Doubtless a part of the school includes so-called summer-run Chinooks, which, according to studies, come from rivers other than the Umpqua and which would not migrate up this stream.

If we hope to save the spring Chinook in the Umpqua River, we must rely upon the effectiveness of the tri-state compact, which, we hope will act as promptly as organizational procedure will permit.

Commons Reaches For All Transport

LONDON, May 6. (AP)—The Labor government's drive to nationalize Britain's key industries neared its final goal today with approval by the House of Commons of a measure to bring under public ownership all inland transport—railroads, buses, trucks, subways, street cars and canals.

The bill now goes to the House of Lords, where heated opposition by the overwhelming conservative majority is expected, but rejection of the measure by the upper house would force a constitutional crisis which might further restrict the already limited powers of the lords.

SALMON, Idaho, May 6. (AP)—John Davis, 30, Ontario, Ore., was drowned in the Salmon River, five miles west of here, in a vain effort to save his brother, Guy, 20, from a similar fate when a crude cable car ferry sank into the river Sunday.

Heavy Price Cuts Made By Building Supply Firm

SEATTLE, May 6. (AP)—Reductions of from 25 to 75 per cent on building materials and 10 per cent on new and used lumber, were announced today by George Matheny, president of a long-established Pacific Northwest building supply firm.

The northwest firm is wrecking Camp White in Medford, Ore., Camp Adair in Corvallis, Ore., and Giles Lake housing project in Portland, from which it is salvaging toilets, pipe, wiring, wash basins and lumber.

Infant Dies as 6th Victim Of Uncle's Killing Orgy

LOUISA, Ky., May 6. (AP)—Lawrence Skeels, 18-month-old, died of a bullet wound in the head today, the fifth victim of an uncle who was slain by possumen yesterday after a wild hunt through the nearby West Virginia mountains.

In a nearby funeral home were the bodies of the boy's mother, Mrs. Nora Bell Skeels, 32; his aunt, Mrs. Susie Billups Hurley, 34; his three-year-old son, Jay, and William Hurley, 45.

Oliver Hurley, 40, was shot down in a gun battle near Wayne, W. Va., yesterday after a coroner's jury named him as the slayer of his relatives.
