such installations as a gas pump, truck scales, sand bin, office entrance steps, lumber dock, and plumbing shop all project beyond the Denn-Gerretsen property line into the street.

Since parking congestion may be relieved if the various installations are removed, City Recorder A. J. Geddes was instructed to notify Gerretsen that "in view of his anticipated prompt cooperation," the city will not "insist" that his plumbing shop be removed from Pine St.

The latter is a permanent installation which projects three feet beyond the property line.

A notice of the city special election May 27, when citizens will vote on a budget to exceed the six per cent limitation, was read.

The ordinance creating a city planning commission was passed on its third reading. Only negative vote was cast by Councilman Croft.

Bus Depot Projected—Application of Herman Steeck to erect a fireproof building at 230 S. Stephens St., to serve as a West Coast Trailways bus depot, was referred to the council by the Fire Commission.

The building site is in the fire zone. Steeck would remove the front porch of an existing residence and erect the depot adjacent to Stephens St. The residence would continue in use as a dwelling and would be separate from the bus depot.

The council stipulated that before a building permit is granted, in that block the alley between S. Stephens and S. Pine, must be improved, so that buses may use the alley in all weather and avoid backing into the depot from Stephens St.

May Shuffle Zone Code—Reporting on parking in alleys, the Police Commission recommended that "the ordinance be enforced."

The question arose at the last council meeting, when Lon Marsters and Harold Horn of the Roseburg Refrigeration Co. requested permission to park their service cars in the alley behind their establishment.

The alley in question is that extending from W. Washington St. to W. Douglas St., between N. Jackson and N. Rose. It being a 20-foot alley, Marsters and Horn

contend they should be allowed to park along a fence on the west side of the alley, thus to avoid blocking traffic.

Marsters said it would cause him "undue hardship" to have to park his service car elsewhere and to carry his heavy tools to and from his shop.

The Police Commission's recommendation was shelved, pending a meeting of City Attorney A. N. Orcutt with members of the commission, the chief of police and the city street superintendent to discuss a new traffic zoning ordinance. The meeting is scheduled at 7:30 P. M., Thursday, at the city hall.

Chief of Police O. A. Kennerly and Fire Chief Glenn H. Taylor were each given "permission" to attend their respective conventions: Kennerly at FBI police administration school at Portland, May 19-21, and Taylor, the annual fire chiefs' convention at Seaside, May 26-27.

A letter from Jerry Saylor, executive secretary of the Public Employees Retirement System, was read by Orcutt, which advised that Roseburg's city librarian is considered a city employee and entitled to participation in the retirement plan. Orcutt said that the librarian has signified her intention of doing so.

The negative report of the Fire Commission, regarding the application of G. S. Logan to build a trailer court on N. Stephens St., near Winchester, was adopted by the council.

Senate Exceeds House in Appropriations Cut

\$10,000,000 for its "Voice of America" broadcasts to Russia and other European countries was in the wind today.

It grew out of a meeting attended by Secretary of State Marshall, Chairman Taber of the House Appropriations Committee and other congressional leaders. Marshall called the session after the refusal of Taber's committee to approve a single penny of the \$31,381,220 the department asked for its cultural relations program.

While neither Taber nor others who attended yesterday's meeting would discuss what, if any, agreements were reached, there were reliable reports that a \$10,000,000 appropriation for foreign broadcasting has been agreed upon tentatively.
