RAMADIER now faces a big job. He must see if he can run France without the aid of the communists and in the face of their bitter and open opposition.

ONE of the members of Ramadier's cabinet (who asks that his name be not used) tells an American correspondent in Paris that he "feels the United States holds the key to success or failure" of the showdown.

JUST how can we provide this help effectively? It is rather simple, as such things go, if we are willing to do what is needed.

If all this came to pass—that is, if the French workers should conclude that they are better off by stringing along with America than by going over to the Russian system—France would be saved from communism.

YOU will note that what this anonymous French cabinet member is proposing to us is practically identical with what we are proposing to do, under the Truman Doctrine, in Greece.

LONG that line, Harold Stassen, just back from a barnstorming tour of Europe in which he talked to a lot of people, including Stalin, says in Washington that he endorses our proposed Greek aid program, but hopes that under it "military expenditures will not be such as to bring about a full-scale civil war in Greece."

BUDGET NECESSITIES

City and school budgets, each carrying proposed appropriations considerably in advance of last year, necessitating special elections to approve or disapprove levies in excess of the constitutional six per cent limitation, have been legally advertised by official publication in the News-Review.

The City of Roseburg asks taxes amounting to \$79,218.53 above the constitutional limit, while the school district seeks \$176,428.48 more than is permitted without special approval. The city's total budget is \$191,435.00 as compared with \$137,360 last year, while the school district budget is \$486,787.43 compared with \$294,920.81 last year.

We have long been crying for development of our natural resources. We have sought industrial payrolls. We have desired a more modern, up-and-coming city. We have sought better schools. We have achieved these desires. In fact, we have had them dumped upon us more rapidly than we can conveniently absorb them.

We are rapidly achieving the industrial payrolls, the increased population, the modernization we have long been seeking. We will decide this month whether we are willing to pay the price for progress.

The two budgets provide moderate salary increases. Few salaries in either the city government or the schools are comparable to compensation obtainable by equally capable people in other lines of work.

In our city government we can reduce the number of policemen and give less protection to lives and property, lop off some of the fire department personnel, cut down the number of street department employes, etc.

We have pointed out in this column on numerous occasions in the past that we can't expect progress without being called upon to foot the bill. The time now has come for a decision. It is going to be expensive not only this year but probably for several years if we attempt to keep city and school services in step with the growth of our community.

These budgets need not be adopted. They may be rejected if voters think best. But it is well to keep in mind the consequences which of necessity would follow rejection.
