"savages" become practically a part of our population. What will we do with them?

An admiral who has been looking after these islands for the navy says in an article in the Saturday Evening Post that he hopes our "reformers and do-gooders" won't be permitted to interfere too seriously with the lives their people have been living.

He points out that in the earlier years of our missionary zeal we shamed large numbers of them into wearing clothes, which they hadn't done before, and as a result of their new and alien way of life they died off like flies.

Will we be able now to take them NAKED into the bosom of our national family? More problems.

THERE are problems everywhere.

In Britain, for example, they passed a law banning the use of electricity and gas for domestic heating from May 5 (Monday) until September 30. The purpose of the ban was to conserve coal.

Tuesday morning members of parliament arose gravely in their places and complained that the new order creates a DIAPER-DRYING crisis. No heat, no dry diapers. Any parent must concede that a situation in which diapers must remain permanently damp contains all the elements of a crisis. And in England, you know, you can't just hang 'em out on the line and let the sun take care of 'em. There isn't that much sun over there.

So the order is modified. Homes of children under three and also those of persons over 70 can be heated this summer. That raises another question: Do British septuagenarians wear diapers?

Anyway, the problems aren't confined to us.

BRITAIN'S house of commons approves a measure bringing under public ownership all inland transport—railroads, buses, trucks, subways, streetcars and canals. In the 21 months it has been in office, the British labor government has already taken over control of the coal mines, the bank of England, all air transport and Britain's worldwide system of communications.

MORGAN TO LEAVE

Paul Morgan, recently promoted to lieutenant in the State Police Department, will leave next week to take over his new duties at the Southern Oregon headquarters in Medford. It is not going to be quite the same without "The Sarge" around, despite the fact that his successor, Sgt. Lyle Harrell, is Morgan's equal as a mixer and good fellow.

The Roseburg district has been particularly fortunate in the type of men who have served as sergeants in charge of police work in the area. The late Ralph Quine, Paul Parsons, and Morgan were much alike in their ability in public relations, inspiring public confidence through fair play, efficiency and sincerity. They will have a worthy successor in Sgt. Harrell, who comes to Roseburg with a fine record.

Morgan and his services, however, will not be completely lost to Roseburg and Douglas County. His work as a lieutenant will occasion frequent official visits, and we are quite sure Morgan will lose no opportunity to spend as much time in Roseburg as his duties will permit. Growing population in Douglas County will require more and more supervisory and administrative assistance from Medford headquarters and, in the near future, we anticipate that it will be necessary to place a lieutenant in charge of the Roseburg district.

Morgan's work as a law enforcement officer has been outstanding, which accounts for his advancement. He is a thorough investigator and a student of latest methods of crime detection and prevention. He has made a special study of methods used by various criminals, particularly those in the break-and-enter "profession," and has on several occasions produced immediate arrests because of his knowledge of peculiarities of methods used in connection with the crime.

He also has exceptional ability in affairs of organization and administration, as well as ability to indoctrinate and train new recruits. He is so completely "sold" on the State Police as an organization that he cannot help "selling" others, particularly those entering the service.

Morgan's activities, however, have not been confined to police work alone. He has been very active in civic affairs, especially those of a public recreational nature. He also has given much time to the welfare of children and young people. The State Police Department is fortunate in the type of men composing its organization. It has a large number of officers who excel in public relations, promoting public confidence and respect, thereby adding to the department's prestige.

His many friends, we well know, join in congratulating him upon his well deserved promotion, as well as looking forward hopefully to the day he will be reestablished as a resident of Roseburg.

RHS Thinclads to Vie at Eugene in District 4 Meet

Coach Jack Newby's Roseburg high track squad returns to Eugene Friday for action in the annual District 4 track and field meet at Hayward Field. Preliminaries will start at 10 A. M., with the finals getting under way at 1:30 P. M.

Entering 10 boys in as many events, Newby stated today that following last week's strong showing at the Tri-County meet the Indians stand a strong chance in earning state meet berths at the district fest tomorrow. Last week, Ed Harvey captured first in the 100 yd. dash in 10.4 seconds, returning to take the quarter mile in 53.5 seconds.

Art Backlund cruised the mile event in 4:44.8 to take a first place and break the Tri-County meet record. He also snared a third place in the half-mile. In the field events last week, Eugene Carr eased to a first spot in clearing the pole vault horizon at 10 feet. John Ulrich tossed the shot put 41 feet 1 inch, and Larry Moore took a fourth in the discus with an 118-foot hurl.

While the Roseburg squad has shown great improvement over the early part of the track season, Newby said it will not be without stiff opposition from teams of Cottage Grove, Eugene, Springfield, Coquille, North Bend, Marshfield, Myrtle Point, University High and Elmira. AFL Union Butchers, Safeway Reach Accord

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8. (AP)—AFL Union butchers have approved a contract with Safeway stores ending a dispute over Monday closing which has kept the food chain's meat counters shut since last June 3. The butchers will work Mondays under the contract. It provides a 40-hour pay scale of \$70 for butchers and \$80 for managers and chief meat cutters. Time and one-half will be paid for Monday work.

Ignorant of Loss of Legs, Boy Waits Chance to Skate

CHICAGO, May 8. (AP)—Dale Richey lay in a hospital bed today fondling a new pair of roller skates. It was tough waiting to get well so he could try them out. But it was tougher for six-year-old Dale's father, Howard Richey, 37, who was faced with the task of telling Dale that—well, that maybe he hadn't better plan on using the skates for a while.

Dale was burned April 9 in a backyard fire. His injuries caused his father a double anxiety. Dale's mother was expecting a new baby momentarily, and the father kept from her the knowledge of their son's condition. Last week the baby was born, and Richey then told the real extent of Dale's injuries. She accepted the news stoically. An adult learns how to bear those things.

But Dale was only a little boy waiting for a chance to use his new skates. And his father is searching for a way to tell him that both his legs have been amputated.

SILICA BIDS FILED

PORTLAND, May 8. (AP)—Three bids for purchase of the war-built silica sand plant near Eugene have been filed with the War Assets Administration. R. A. Babl Hardware Co., Eugene, bid \$18,057; Peters Lumber Co., Eugene, \$11,000, and Silica Products Oregon, Ltd., operator, offered to lease the plant for five years at \$1,800 a year.
