

Roseburg Scout to Attend Jamboree Slated in France

The Oregon Trail council will be represented at the International Jamboree to be held at Moisson, France, August 9 to 22. Camping and Activities Chairman Percy Brown indicates the following boys' applications have been accepted and approved to be official representatives of the Oregon Trail Council: Alex Byler, life scout of Troop 20, Coos Bay; Dick Conklin, first class Scout of Troop 41, North Bend; Eagle Scout Robert Furrer, Troop 12, Eugene; and life Scout Larry Henninger of Troop 4, Roseburg.

These four Scouts will become a part of Region XI contingent comprising two full troops. Deputy Regional Executive Walter Whidden and vice president of the North Central Montana council, a full-blooded Black Feet chief, will head the Region XI contingent.

The group from Region XI will meet at Butte, Montana, for a three-day preliminary training period July 5. From there they will leave for New York with a stop over in Chicago and Greenville Village at Dearborn. They also plan to visit either Niagara Falls or West Point and see New

York prior to a four-day training period on a nation-wide basis at Camp Kilmar, New Jersey.

The contingent of one thousand Scouts and Leaders from the United States will embark for England July 18. Tours will include England, Holland and Normandy in France. Following the jamboree, August 9 to 22 at Moisson, France, which is located fifty miles from Paris, the group will return by boat and arrive home about Labor Day.

The Scouts this fall will report their experiences to numerous service clubs, and Scout Courts of Honor throughout the Oregon Trail Council.

Terminal Leave Pay Differences Explained to Vets

The fact that recently discharged ex-servicemen are receiving government terminal leave checks is leading other veterans wrongly to believe that their own non-negotiable five-year terminal leave bonds can be cashed in immediately. George E. Sandy, Oregon director of Veterans' Affairs, said in hastening to explain the difference between the two payments.

"If a veteran shows you his government check marked 'terminal leave,' and this check amounts to more than \$50, you can be sure that he was discharged after August 31, 1946, and is actually on terminal leave and is being paid for accrued leave time up to

a maximum of 60 days," Sandy explained.

"Now, if the same man shows you a terminal leave bond in addition to his check," the director went on, "then it means that he had accumulated more than 60 days of leave before the armed forces terminal leave act went into effect last August 31. In this case, the bond is payment for that part of his leave over the 60 days, and like all such bonds, is non-negotiable and cannot be cashed for five years."

In reviewing last year's armed forces terminal leave act, these points were stressed:

1. All enlisted men with unused leave time up to the time of the act of August 31 would be paid for this unused time, just as officers always were paid, up to a maximum of 120 days. The act provided that the enlisted men's pay for this unused leave would be in the form of bonds, to pay off five years after discharge.
2. After August 31, 1946, no one

in service could accumulate more than 60 days of unused leave, but officers and enlisted personnel would get the same treatment of discharge and receiving pay until their leave time is consumed.
