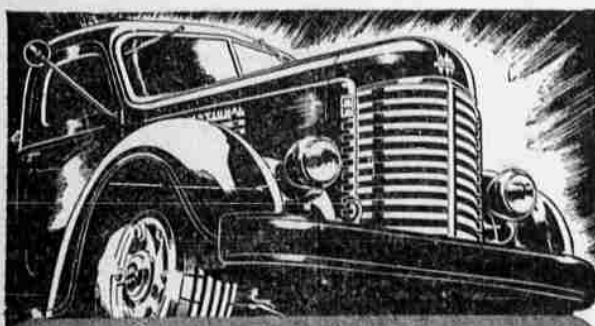

**Offers Thus Far Fail To Satisfy Strikers**

Company officials said the announced "back-to-work" movement failed to materialize throughout Washington and Idaho. Less than 20 per cent of the workers returned to their jobs, they said, adding that these were principally in accounting, commercial and long-line departments.

Chisholm said last night the "back-to-work" announcement was a "last desperate attempt to cause a collapse of the strike (by) the CIO-American Communications Association."

**Back-to-Work Vote Set by Oregon Workers Tonight**

PORTLAND, Ore., May 13.—Oregon telephone workers on strike since April 7 will vote tonight on a back-to-work proposal.

The proposal, from the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company, offers a \$4 weekly pay increase to workers in Portland and nearby exchanges, and \$3 to those in other cities.

It also embodies what some union officials have called "discriminatory provisions." This led Don Gramshaw, Salem chairman of the United Telephone Employees of Oregon, to announce workers there voted last night, 108 to 3, to accept the company's proposal "only if the provisions are modified to provide better protection for strikers against company discrimination." He said the ballot was advisory only.

No matter what is the outcome of the vote, there remains the probability pickets still will be around the exchanges in the Portland area. Western Electric employees also are on strike, and no settlement is in sight. In other areas telephone workers have respected Western Electric picket lines.

**School Budget Backed By Laborites, C. of C.**

Superintendent Paul S. Elliott today of the special school election tomorrow, in which a levy \$176,428.48 above the six per cent limitation is being asked.

The election will be held at the Junior High School between the hours of 2 and 7 P. M. Persons qualified to vote in the election are those paying property taxes in School District No. 4 (Roseburg), or those holding stock in corporations paying taxes within the district.

The special levy would be used to pay salary boosts for teachers, to provide additional classrooms, and to meet higher operating costs of the schools.

"Every person interested in the schools should register his vote in the election," Elliott said. "If the election fails to carry, the children will be drastically affected."

"You can leave children property and wealth, and it will be dissipated unless they have the proper education. On the other hand, education is something you can never take away from your children."

Results of the election will be known tomorrow night after closing of the polling place, when an election board composed of H. B. Church, J. B. Bailey, Mrs. H. C. Darby and Mrs. Mabel Harness, count the ballots.

The school board will canvass the vote at its next regular meeting Monday night.

gested that most reductions would be in the police, fire, and street departments.

One item that will remain in any event, is the \$12,000 allowance for the city manager department, which is supported by a 2.5 mills continuing tax levy, passed at the time voters approved the changeover to city manager government.

Another item in the budget that cannot be pared, Collier said, is the allowance for bond indebtedness, amounting to \$22,330. He pointed out several places in the budget where reductions would be made, if voters cast a negative vote May 27.

Collier blamed the "short sightedness" of last year's budget committee in not calling a special election last spring to preserve a \$45,000 cash balance, which was used to keep the 1946-47 budget within the six per cent limitation.

Mayor Flegel pointed out that the various amounts of money

budgeted for city departments need not be spent entirely. If for example, a secretary to the city manager may be hired for less than \$2,400 annually, the balance will remain in the general fund.

Several other questions dealt with the necessity for various budgeted items. One, concerning the sufficiency of liability insurance carried by the fire department, will be answered at the next council meeting.
