Ex-Sgt. at Arms of House Convicted Of Hiding Shortage

WASHINGTON, May 16. — A federal court jury yesterday convicted Kenneth Romney, 65, former House sergeant at arms, on charges of concealing for two decades a shortage of \$143,863 in his accounts.

Judge Alexander Holtzoff postponed sentencing Romney until May 23, to allow time for consideration of a defense motion for a new trial. Romney was allowed to remain free on \$2500 bond.

The maximum penalty upon conviction is 30 years imprisonment and \$30,000 fine.

Romney was indicted on charges of making false reports to the general accounting office on the amount of cash he had on hand at the sergeant at arms' bank, where members of the House of Representatives keep their salary funds.

Judge Holtzoff told the jury that the government's evidence "tended to show" that Romney himself had taken more than \$5,000 and permitted several others to cash bad checks.

The jurist said also that the evidence indicated Romney had allowed former Rep. John H. Smithwick, Florida Democrat, to cash checks in excess of \$65,000.

The court said the evidence showed these checks were "not made good" by Smithwick although listed by Romney as cash. Smithwick is now reported to be seriously ill.

The government contended that Romney and Smithwick lost large amounts in joint real estate deals in Florida in the 20's.

'Kill' Order Issued for Federal Aid to Schools

WASHINGTON, May 15. — The House Republican leadership was reported today to have issued orders to the Labor Committee to kill a bill which would give states \$300,000,000 a year in federal aid for schools.

A high-ranking party member who does not want his name used told reporters the orders will be carried out because of GOP pledges to hold down government spending.

Coast Loop Lead Unchanged; Angels Lose Ace Hurler

It was still ding-dong for the Pacific Coast League lead today, with the San Francisco Seals and Los Angeles Angels still knotted up after winning efforts last night.

But it was a costly victory for the Angels. They lost the services indefinitely of their big ace southpaw, Cliff Chambers of Bellingham, who pulled a back muscle in the fifth inning after holding Oakland to one single, by Lodigiani.

The Angels went on, with Dobner and Osborn dividing the twirling, to win, 5-2, and give Chambers his eighth straight against no defeats. Schuster's four singles contributed heavily to Pippin's defeat.

The Seals made it three in a row over Hollywood's downward-shooting Stars, 7-4.

The Portland Beavers, one of the loop's winningest clubs at home, won a seven-inning contest, 2-1, from San Diego, and tied, 7-7, in an eight-inning nightcap stopped by the curfew.

Moody's six-hit pitching, capped by a bases-loaded single by Lazor in the last inning, gave Portland the opener and moved the Beavers up to third place, as Sacramento bowed to Seattle, 8-3.

The Beavers rallied for five runs in the seventh inning of the afterpiece to tie the score.

The tied game will be replayed in another doubleheader tonight. Seattle's win, giving the Rainiers a 2-1 edge in the series with Sacramento, also put them within a half-game of seventh-place Hollywood.

A five-run blast off Dasso in the sixth, featured by Hensley's triple with the sacks crammed, clinched the issue for Seattle.

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
