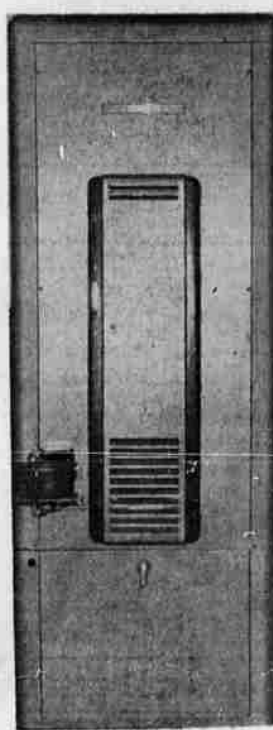
Roseburg Golfers Defeat Coos, 50-25

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Cardinals Jinxed By Inability To Beat Left-handers

Others have called it just "a slow start."

But it was apparent today that the trouble with the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals is that the rest of the National League has been ganging up on them with an unorthodox barrage of left-handed pitchers.

Including their double defeat by the Philadelphia Phillies yesterday—which incidentally sunk them deeper into the cellar, seven full games off the pace—the frustrated Redbirds have been beaten by southpaws 11 times this season against only two wins against portside pitching.

After Hentzelman, ex-Pirate, held the Cards to nine hits in the opener to beat them, 6-3, Raffensberger blanked the Cards through 12 innings to win the nightcap, 1-0.

Six Teams Neck-and-Neck—Except for the Cards, the National League pennant race resembles a mob scene with only a game and a half separating the first place Boston Braves and the sixth place Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Braves retained their half game edge over the New York Giants by splitting a doubleheader with the Reds in Cincinnati, winning the second game behind Barrett, 3-1, after Blackwell of the Reds had outpitched Cooper in the opener, 2-1.

After the Pittsburgh Pirates had overcome a 6-1 New York lead in the opener to win 7-6, the Giants came back to take the abbreviated seven-inning nightcap, 11-6, to retain second place.

The Dodgers ended a skein of 18 scoreless innings by tallying four times in the seventh to down the Cubs, 4-2.

Feller Halts Yankees—Feller made his first start of the season at Yankee Stadium a success by turning back the New York Yankees, 5-3, gaining his fifth victory against three setbacks.

Scoring two runs in the ninth inning of each game, the Chicago White Sox took the measure of Washington's Senators twice, 4-2 and 3-2.

Philadelphia's surprising Athletics moved into sixth place, only four and a half games behind the first place Detroit Tigers, by trimming the St. Louis Browns twice, 4-3 and 5-2.

Rain washed out the scheduled doubleheader between the Tigers and second place Boston Red Sox.

Oregon Payrolls Head For New All-Time High
PORTLAND, May 19.—(AP)—Oregon payrolls this year may top the previous high of 1944 if first quarter trends continue, the state employment compensation commission reported today.

Payrolls the first quarter of 1947 totaled \$195,000,000 to \$200,000,000, the highest for any similar peacetime period since 1936 and above the \$191,000,000 in 1945. The first quarter of 1946 was \$145,000,000.

The peak employment level of \$800,000,000 was in 1944. Unemployment in the state dropped from 45,000 to 37,000 during April, a continuation of the steady decline since mid-February, the commission reported.

North Bend Votes for 'Excess' School Budget
NORTH BEND, May 19.—(AP)—Twenty-two favorable votes out of a total of 54 cast in Friday's special school budget election resulted in adoption of a \$227,748 North Bend public schools budget for 1947-48.

The budget is about \$35,000 in excess of the statutory six per cent increase limitation. It provides for \$500 increases in salaries of staff members and \$25,683 for a special building fund.
