Tussock Moth to be
Fought With DDT
Dropped by Planes

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 24.—(AP)—The birds and the bees will get their share of attention when the first planes take to the air to drop DDT on 350,000 acres of timber infested with tussock moth in the nation's greatest aerial spraying program.

Two wildlife specialists are among the experts who will study the effects of the "wonder insecticide" upon birds, fish and insects less destructive than the fire-eating moths.

J. C. Evenden, federal entomologist, said Mitchell G. Hanavan, Seattle, would study effects of the spraying on game birds and the food organisms on which they feed. Lowell Adams, Missoula, Mont., will observe what DDT does to fish and fish food. Both men are with the fish and wildlife service.

Evenden said the spraying was not expected to be harmful to birds, except that it might destroy much of their food supply, forcing them to change eating habits or migrate elsewhere.

Fish are extremely vulnerable to DDT, he said, but there are few trout in the area to be treated and high water in streams will favor quick recovery of fish in streams contaminated. Loss of insect life, however, may effect fish considerably, he said.

As for the bees, project leaders have arranged to cover hives in the area to protect them from the spray or to move the bees out of the region.

E. H. Myrick, forest service coordinator, said wandering bees which roam into sprayed areas in search of honey at least won't come back to affect the rest of the hive as they have when other poisons were used.

"Once they get some DDT," he said, "they don't come back."

No. 2 Gestapo Chieftain
Nabbed After Long Hunt

MUNICH, May 23.—(AP)—Brig. Gen. Eric Neumann, principal adjutant to Nazi Gestapo Chieftain Heinrich Himmler, has been captured in Bavaria after a two-year search by American war crimes investigators, it was announced today.

The SS (Elite Guard) general had been one of the most eagerly sought of German fugitives. He had been commander of security police in Holland and Belgium and was combat commander of Nuernberg.

He was found using an assumed name and working as a farmer near the Austrian border in the neighborhood of Berchtesgaden.

Wall St. Methods Point
To Crash, Congress Told

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(AP)—Rep. Sabath (D-Ill.), told the House yesterday that "outrageous, crooked dealings" are going on in Wall Street that may lead to another crash. He said he will

introduce a bill to put a 5 per cent tax on all short sales of securities.

"If we don't stop the short sellers and gamblers on the New York Stock Exchange," Sabath said, "we'll have disaster in this country."

He said stocks have been driven down as much as 50 per cent. "It is nearer 75 per cent," Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.), interrupted.

Socialist Premier

TOKYO, May 23.—(AP)—Tetsu Katayama, 60-year-old Socialist leader, was elected Japan's new premier by almost unanimous vote of the House of Representatives tonight.

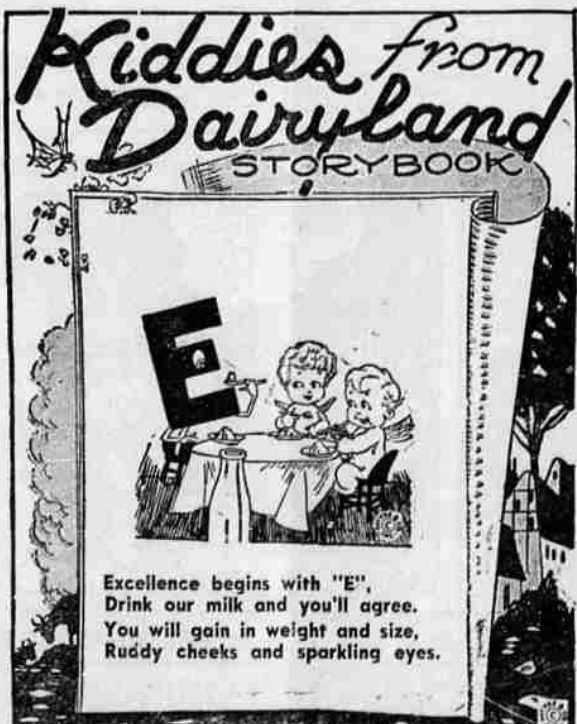
