Heat Relief Skips Grainland Areas

(By the Associated Press)
Temperatures lowered today in Western Oregon and Washington for the first time in more than a week as scattered showers were reported, but eastern areas of the two states had little promise of relief.

The Weather Bureau said the showers were scattered over the state, but drought-hit grainlands were not helped. An electric storm—but no rain—struck the Central Oregon wheat belt yesterday.

Temperatures yesterday reached new highs, with Pendleton's 96 topping Oregon while Portland's downtown 92 was the highest for the year. The mercury had reached 91 degrees twice previously in the current heat wave. In Washington, Walla Walla sweltered at 98 yesterday for the high reading of the region.

Rains in Northern California were moving northward, the Weather Bureau said, helping to boost humidity percentages and speed reopening of logging operations through the fir belt.

Pay Hike Given Oregon Unions in Pine Operations

BEND, Ore., May 27.—(AP)—Two AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers Unions today reported signing of a new wage contract for a 71 cent hourly increase.

The agreement was called the "first break" in current negotiations between AFL unions and Central and Eastern Oregon Pine employers. Union officials said they expected it to set a pattern for the area.

The agreement brought common labor to a minimum of \$1.32 hourly, the previous \$1.25 scale was 23 cents higher than generally prevails in pine operations.

The increase matched the 71 cent rise agreed upon recently by AFL and CIO unions in fir operations.
