The award was presented to Alton F. Baker, publisher of the Eugene, Ore., Register-Guard, chairman of Region 11, and O. D. Sharpe, Portland, Ore., regional scout executive.

Honoring the late Maj. Lorillard Spencer, a member of the National Executive Board from 1912 to 1914, the award was given for increasing membership in the region by 11.1 per cent, from 88,472 to 98,263.

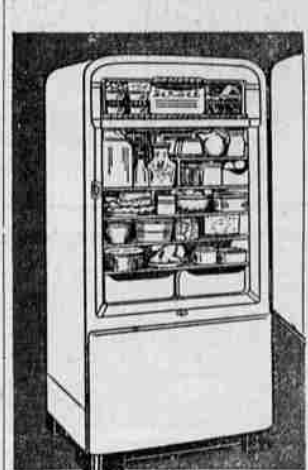
