News Items Relating To Farming Industry

Housewives and industries are being urged to buy sugar early so supplies can be moved while transportation is available. The Sugar Cane Industry Administration says, but it does mean an advance in the dates when purchases may be made. Receipts of sugar from Cuba are at their seasonal peak, and distributors temporarily have large stocks. Furthermore, box cars available now will shortly be needed to move the billion bushel wheat crop. A second 10-pound stamp for consumers (No. 121) now valid, expires October 31. This also includes any sugar used for canning.

Slaughter to Halt Disease

About 18,000 animals have been slaughtered and buried in the campaign to stamp out the foot-and-mouth disease in Mexico. Slightly more than half of these were cattle, and the rest were sheep, swine and goats. In addition, about 75,000 apparently healthy animals have been sent to slaughter in the main quarantine zone in southeastern Mexico, in order to reduce the numbers of susceptible livestock in that area. Officials expect that more than 1,000 animals will be slaughtered daily when the control program reaches full swing.

About 12,000 oxen—used by Mexican farmers for draft purposes—were included among the animals slaughtered. These are being replaced by mules, which are not susceptible to foot-and-mouth disease. Estimates show 50,000 more mules will be needed; 5,000 have already been obtained from northern Mexican states. Tractors will be used as replacements where conditions justify.

Hairy Vetch Crop Drops

Hairy vetch production, a new and promising farm industry in 16 central Texas counties, jumped from near zero in 1942 to an estimated 200,000 acres in 1947. More than half the current acreage may be harvested for seed going a long way toward making up the deficit which resulted from several years of shrinking vetch seed production in Oregon, hitherto the chief source of supply. Oregon hairy vetch seed production reached a peak of 32 million pounds in 1942 and since then has dropped to a

Traffic Safety Caravan Slates Visit to Roseburg

A group of four orange and white cars will embark from the Los Angeles City Hall Monday, June 2, on a "Motor Mercy Mission," covering three Pacific Coast cities.

Due to the number of motor accidents so evident today, Union Oil, in an attempt to combat them, has assembled a "30,000 Mile Endurance Safety Run" caravan. Under the leadership of the noted Earl Cooper, famous auto racing driver, the caravan will travel up and down the West Coast demonstrating that one can travel continuously, a distance greater than the circumference of the earth without having an accident. . . . If courtesy and safety on the road is stressed.

In conjunction with the caravan's arrival, there has been arranged a safe driving contest. The purpose of this contest is to discover the local driver who has traveled the greatest number of miles in the longest period of time without ever having received a traffic citation or been involved in an accident.

Entrants in this contest will write a letter to the Safety Award Editor of the News-Review outlining his or her record of driving. Claims will be checked against police and traffic court records. The presentation of the award will be made by Mayor Al Flegel along with Earl Cooper who will arrive with the "Royal Triton Caravan" about June 6.

Conservation Expands

A record amount of conservation work is in prospect for Oregon farms and ranches this year. Although final tabulations aren't ready on farm plans filed for participation in the 1947 agricultural conservation program, enough information has been received to show that farmers intend to carry out more soil building, erosion control and water conservation practices than ever before. It's almost certain that farmers taking part in the program will earn considerably more than the \$3 million given to Oregon as this state's share of the \$300,000,000 authorized by Congress.

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last year for the 1947 practices. Reserves increased.

Oregon's federal crop insurance program is in a sound position, with substantial reserves to meet losses resulting from drought, crickets and frost that are plaguing wheat growers in some parts of the state this year.

Premiums paid in by growers in the past several years of good crops have accumulated state reserves of almost 400,000 bushels. Nine counties now have reserves, and many growers have built up individual reserves to the point where they are entitled to premium rate reductions as preferred risks.

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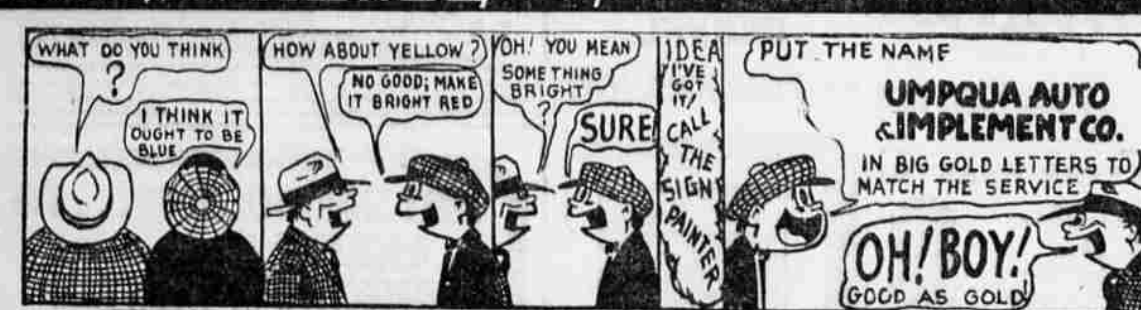
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
