Allowance Boost for Married Vets Favored

WASHINGTON, May 29. — The House Veterans committee has voted for an increase from \$90 to \$105 a month in the living allowance for married veterans going to school under the G. I. bill of rights, but decided against any increase in the \$65 allowed single veterans.

Legislation approved by the committee provides also for \$20 monthly allowance for the first child and \$15 for each additional child of married veterans.

The committee put into the bill what some members called an "anti-Communist" provision. This declares that the rights to payments will be forfeited by any person who advocates overthrow of the government by force or violence or belongs to an organization certified by the FBI as advocating such overthrow.

Genevieve Blake of Waves Featured in Magazine Story

Genevieve Blake, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grover Blake of Roseburg, who has spent nearly three years in the Waves, is the story in a recent issue of *Alhambra*, publication of the Naval Air Transport Service.

With her log book showing 1,734 hours in flight, Miss Blake has spent more time in the air than probably any other wave in the Naval Air Transport Service. She has been on the run from Moffett Field, Calif., to Honolulu since July, 1945.

Prior to entering the Navy, she received her private pilot's license for single engine aircraft, having 175 hours of official solo time.

She was taking the preliminary flight course for the Waspas (Women's Airforce Service Pilots) at Connor Field in Blythe, Calif., when that activity was discontinued. So she joined the Navy.

After "boot" training at Hunter College in the Bronx, New York City, she was assigned to special training for Waves at Olathe, Kansas, which led to her eventual assignment to the Hawaii-California run as flight orderly on the Naval transport planes.

In her log book she recorded 55 round trips to Honolulu and back (approximately 231,000 miles) or almost 10 times around the world.

Among her outstanding flights were those on which allied military prisoners held in Japanese camps were returned to the United States, and when a cargo of Christmas toys was flown to forward areas for the American Red Cross along with \$7 million dollars in currency.

Genevieve is known to her friends in the service as "Jimmy." She expects to be released from the Navy in June.

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
