Frost Resistance Cut By Some Plant Sprays

WOOSTER, Ohio — Plants sprayed in summer with fungicides containing copper apparently become more sensitive to frost damage than those treated with zinc-containing organic materials, J. D. Wilson of the Ohio Agriculture Experiment Station reports.

The reason is not clear, he says, but it may be that zinc-treated plants were in better foliage condition before the frost. Plants sprayed with Bordeaux mixture were most severely injured by October frost, he adds.

Loans Aid Vets in Homes, Business

Nearly 8,000 Oregon veterans have realized their wartime dreams of owning a home, farm, or small business of their own with the aid of G. I. loans amounting to \$37,538,000, according to the Veterans Administration regional office in Portland.

Up to May 1, approvals have been granted for G. I. loans on 6,304 homes, 1,155 small businesses and 456 farms. The loans, made to veterans by private lending institutions and backed by VA guaranty, averaged \$5,054 on homes, \$3,300 on businesses and \$4,080 on farms.

Actual guarantees under the G. I. bill have averaged 47 per cent of each loan. Only a small percentage of loans have been large enough to use the maximum guaranty of \$4,000 on real property or \$2,000 on non-real business property; the guaranteed portion cannot be more than half the entire loan.

Since the start of this year, the VA has approved 1,916 loans for guaranty in Oregon, totaling \$9,711,650. Reflecting a general slow-up in realty sales, veterans' applications have slipped from a high of 130 a week in April to slightly less than 100 a week in May, the VA reports.
