Observations on Congress From an Inside Viewpoint

Recently I appeared before the House Committee on Public Lands to urge the passage of my bill, H. R. 2354. This bill, if passed, would have the result of opening up two and one-half million acres of O. & C. lands to mineral entry and exploration. The story back of this bill, which story also reveals the need of its passage, is briefly told. When the government recaptured the vast O. & C. land grant lands by the passage of the reversion act of 1916, it was obviously the intent of Congress that the reversioned lands should be subject to the same mineral and mining laws as are other lands in the public domain.

When the O. & C. Act of 1937, which provided for the administration of the O. & C. lands on a sustained yield basis, was passed, I do not think Congress intended to alter the status of these lands so far as minerals and mining were concerned. However, in 1940, the Comptroller General issued an opinion, later sustained by the highest government legal authority, that the 1937 act repealed the mineral provisions of the 1916 act.

So, the situation now is that all mineral exploration and development on some two and a half million acres is prevented. It will be necessary for Congress to pass my bill, or an identical bill introduced in the Senate by Senator Guy Cordon, in order to unblock the present almost total restriction on the development of vast potential mining area in Western Oregon.

I have presented these facts to the committee and am hopeful that favorable action on the bill will be forthcoming.

Hearings Attended
Much of my time lately has been devoted to appearance at House and Senate Committee hearings on various bills. In addition to the testimony before the Public Lands Committee first mentioned, I appeared before the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture, the Senate Appropriations Committee on the Interior appropriation bill, the Civil Functions Appropriation Subcommittee on flood control and rivers and harbors projects, and the Armed Services Committee on officer retirement bill.

Labor Bill Pondered
As this is written, the House-Senate Conference Committee, which has been working out a compromise labor bill, has not yet made its report. I have received considerable mail on this subject and am glad to have the views of those who have written me. My intention regarding my vote on final consideration of the labor bill is to use my very best judgment. If, in my opinion, the conference bill is fair, reasonable and constructive so far as labor, management and the whole public is concerned, I shall vote for it. If I find, after careful consideration of it, that the bill is not a fair and reasonable and a desirable piece of legislation, I shall vote against it. I know of no other way to reach a decision on such hotly controversial legislation.
