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Vote Fraud Probe Halted by Clark, FBI Head States

WASHINGTON, June 5.—(AP)—J. Edgar Hoover said today the FBI had questioned only six persons when the Justice Department decided last fall that there was no grounds for federal prosecution of alleged voting frauds in Kansas City.

The "preliminary" inquiry, the FBI chief testified to a Senate Judiciary subcommittee, was thus limited on instructions from Attorney General Clark.

The committee is inquiring into the Justice Department's actions in a situation which has brought a State Grand Jury's indictment of 78 persons for election law violations and the theft from the blown safe of some ballots on which the Grand Jury based the charges.

The alleged frauds were in the Democratic primary last August in which Enos Axtell defeated Rep. Roger Slaughter for the nomination to Congress, only to lose to a Republican in the election. The State Grand Jury said Axtell's victory was fraudulent.

President Truman publicly supported Axtell. With that in mind, reporters asked him at a news

conference today for comment on the newest developments in the situation. He replied that a vote fraud is the worst thing that can happen in a democracy and said the inquiry should be carried through to its logical conclusion.

After last fall's Justice Department decision that no federal action was called for, the Kansas City Star pressed an investigation of its own. It was largely on evidence developed by the newspaper that the State Grand Jury acted.

And yesterday in Kansas City FBI Agent Dwight Brantley announced he had received "authorization from the attorney general . . . to conduct a full and complete investigation . . ."

Bond on Log Haulers Upheld in Court Ruling
ASTORIA, Ore., June 5.—Circuit Judge Howard Zimmerman has handed down a decision in a test case in Columbia County, holding that county courts have authority to impose permits and require bonds of log haulers and other heavy trucks.

The test case grew out of a program of the county court for requiring bond of log haulers to protect the county against damage to county roads.

Clatsop county has also established a similar program, requiring that log haulers post bond to out permits to operate on county guarantee against road damage, roads.

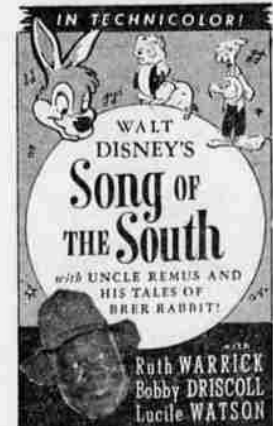
