fraction of a second to use which ever one promises the best results under the circumstances of the moment, wins few fights.

At a session in Washington this week, President Truman "indicated" to Argentina's ambassador this country's "willingness to sit down with Argentina and the other American republics to draft a mutual defense treaty."

DIPLOMATS in Washington say they expect as a result of the conference that this country will now agree to sell military equipment to the Argentine government.

That would be a gesture of confidence. When, after a quarrel with somebody, you patch up your troubles with him to the extent that you are willing to sell him a gun and ammunition to fit it, it is a sure sign that you want to be friends with him.

FOLLOWING the good will session with Argentina, Spruille Braden resigns as assistant secretary of state. It was Braden who, as our ambassador to Argentina, guessed wrong on Peron, who is the Argentine strong man. Braden openly tried to defeat him in an Argentine election.

PERON WON. That put us on a hot spot. The purpose of the Truman conference was undoubtedly to get us off it. Braden's resignation is a diplomatic way of saying that we have changed our minds.

If we are going to face Russia throughout the coming decades in a spirit of competition, it certainly behooves us to build all possible good will among our neighbors of the Western Hemisphere. It never pays to have a scrap in your back yard when you are looking for trouble at the front door.

In the past, we haven't been too smart in our relations with our neighbors to the south. Our attitude toward them has smack-ed too much of "big I and little you." There has been plenty of talk of good will to the left, but not enough FEELING of good will at the bottom levels.

JIM JONES' BUDGET

Many people apparently fail to understand why city and school taxes must be drastically increased when assessed valuation is growing so rapidly. It would seem that new homes, new business, new industry and other new taxable assets should offset or balance the need for more taxes.

But people puzzled by failure of assessed valuation and tax levies to operate together are overlooking, or are unfamiliar with, Oregon's outmoded, antedated, reactionary 6 per cent limitation.

Talking about tax increases in dollars, and ratio of tax base to assessed valuation only serves to confuse some readers, so let's try to reduce the situation to a simple illustration:

Let's take the case of an imaginary Jim Jones who works in a downtown office. Jones is married to a woman who controls the family treasury.

Mrs. Jones has fixed opinions regarding hubby's expenditures. Jim is allowed 10 cents for transportation, 50 cents for his noon meal, and 10 cents for cigarets. That's all!

Jim has had a couple of salary boosts. His income has nearly doubled, but wife hasn't increased Jim's allowance. But Jim finds 10 cents won't pay for transportation. His 50 cents for a noon meal won't buy more than a lettuce sandwich and a cup of coffee, and he is losing weight and getting sickly.

Friend wife, however, doesn't see any reason why Jim can't get along on his allowance, so she insists he stay within the dole, yielding to his protestations only enough to add six cents per month.

That is exactly the position in which our tax levying bodies find themselves. The state law permits them to add only 6 per cent annually to the levy. This 6 per cent is not in the RATE of levy; it is in AMOUNT, or, IN DOLLARS.

For instance, if a district had a budget of \$100,000 last year it could adopt a legal budget of only \$106,000 this year. It is limited to \$106,000 even though the value of property within the district may have increased 10 times, and demands for services doubled or trebled.

It makes no difference that we have more assessable wealth, nor that population has doubled in the city and trebled in the school district. Our "allowance" known as our "tax base" can be upped only 6 per cent annually.

Other factors are to be considered. During depression years few of our taxing districts added their 6 per cent. Because of general unemployment, salaries were low. Cost of government was below normal. Taxpayers were given the benefit of that condition. Despite low taxes, many people in financial distress were unable to pay. Much property, becoming delinquent, was forfeited by owners and title was taken by city and county.

During the earlier period of our expansion, a considerable amount of money was received from payment of delinquent taxes. Demand for timber and real estate rose and the county and city sold off the lands they had acquired. Collection of delinquent taxes and sales of property gave much income in addition to normal taxes, and it was not necessary to add the annual 6 per cent permitted by law.

Last year, for instance, the City of Roseburg budget exceeded the 6 per cent limitation by more than \$45,000, but, because of accumulated surplus money it was not necessary to call an election.

Had we been adding the 6 per cent annually during depression years and years following when we had extra income, and had we accumulated reserve funds to be used today when salaries, material costs, and everything pertaining to administration are high, we would not be faced with present difficulties.

But taxpayers were given benefits of those conditions, and we are now faced with the task of administering school and municipal service needs of greatly increased population with an "allowance" only slightly higher than that of 1930. And all this despite our greatly increased valuation and general growth.

Psychologist Job Opened to Exam

The Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for psychologist (personal counselor) for employment in Veterans Administration field offices in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States. The salary is \$4,962 a year.

To qualify, applicants must have completed specified college courses in psychology and related subjects, or they must have completed all course requirements, except the thesis, for a Ph. D. degree in psychology. In addition, they must have had three years of experience in the application of psychological principles and counseling techniques, or three years of college teaching in appropriate psychology subjects, or a combination of these two types of experience.

Graduate study in psychology beyond that required for a master's degree may be substituted for as much as one year of experience. No written test is required. Applicants will be rated on their experience, education and training. The maximum age limit is 62 years.
