Aviation Cadet Training Opened

Aviation cadet pilot training is now available to civilian young men, according to official word received yesterday by the U. S. Army Recruiting office here.

Previously aviation cadet training was open only to enlisted personnel serving with the Army, but selected groups of civilians are now being chosen for the AAF's peacetime strength.

Eligibility for cadet pilot training will be determined on the following points:

Applicants must be unmarried and agree to remain single during the training period; be between 18 and 26 years of age; have earned at least one-half of the credits leading to a degree at an accredited college or be able to pass a comparable educational examination.

In addition, men must be of excellent character, sound physique and in good health.

Those found eligible will be placed on quota lists, with further instructions when to report to the Primary Training School at Randolph Field, Texas. Graduates will be commissioned second lieutenants in the Army and assigned to pilot duty with the air forces.

Graduates receiving commissions will serve on active duty for the duration plus six months, or for three years, unless sooner relieved.

Taylor's 3rd Win Boosts Brooklyn To League's Top

Freshman Harry Taylor, whose third straight pitching victory coincided with Brooklyn's arrival in first place, is hailed in Flatbush as the man who could pitch the Dodgers to the National League pennant.

Ostermuller, who has taken particular delight in beating Brooklyn consistently since the Cardinals tried to send him back to the minor leagues in 1944, was Taylor's opponent yesterday. Taylor turned in his best effort, a two-hit, 3-0 victory over Pittsburgh.

The win boosted the Brooks into the lead because the New York Giants and the Chicago Cubs, who had been tied for first place, split a doubleheader.

After Erickson of the Cubs had tamed the Giants with three hits in a 5-1 opening game, the Giants slashed away at three Chicago throwers for an eight-run third-inning to even matters with a 9-3 decision. Kennedy, sent right back after being knocked out Wednesday, came through with his fifth win.

Cincy Wins Twin Bill

Cincinnati's Blackwell ran his victory total to seven by shutting out the Phillies, 5-0, with six hits, the Reds flattening Ruffensberger with a five-run first inning. Gumbert's fine relief pitching enabled the Reds to take the second game, 6-3, for a clean sweep of the doubleheader. Cincy hopped into fifth place on the day's work.

Marlon's homer with two on in the ninth enabled the St. Louis Cardinals to pull out a 5-3 decision over Boston's Sain. The Cards now are within three percentage points of the seventh-place Phils. Yankees Down Tigers

The New York Yankees continued to crush the American League leading Detroit Tigers, 7-0, on Chandler's three-hit work. Three out of four over the Tigers left the Yankees only one game behind the Bengals.

Flores' three-hitter boosted Philadelphia's A's into a third-place tie with Boston and Cleveland on a 5-2 win over Chicago's Smith. Wynn of Washington shut out Cleveland, 3-0, with six hits in a game marred by an injury to Manager Lou Boudreau of the Tribe. Boudreau left the game with a side injury in the third inning.

Boston and St. Louis were not scheduled.

Wheat Yield in Eastern Washington to be Light

ODESSA, Wash., June 6.—(AP)—Hundreds of thousands of acres of Eastern Washington wheatland will bear only a fraction of last year's yield this summer, grain dealers predicted today.

Although soaking rains fell over a large part of the Northwest during the last several days, a rain was spotty over the Big Bend country with the southwest section receiving little or no relief.

W. C. Raugust of the Odessa Trading Company, grain dealers in Southwestern Big Bend, said several hundred thousand acres there will produce no more than half of last year's crops — 15 bushels per acre or less.

Ten thousand or 15,000 acres of new land west of Odessa will not

be harvested, he said, unless rains come "immediately."

J. D. Urquhart of the Union Elevator and Warehouse Company at Lind said yield in that area would be 25 to 30 per cent under last year.
