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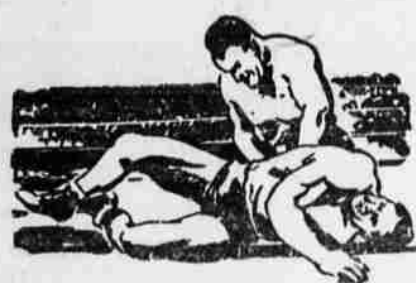

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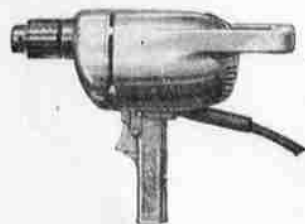
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Guistinas Take
10-to-3 Revenge
On Umpqua Chiefs

Failing to overcome a previous three-game slump, the Umpqua Chiefs bowed, 10-3, to a revengeful Guistinas Reds nine Wednesday night under Eugene's Civic Stadium lights.

A non-league game, it was the Chiefs fourth straight defeat. The Chiefs previously defeated Guistinas Reds, 4-2, on the former's home grounds.

Sewing up the contest in a long second inning, the Reds used four hurlers against the erring Chiefs, allowing a total of seven hits and field combinations of 15 players.

The Reds started the scoring in the first frame when Charley Dunn and Allie Cooper came in on Joe Volk's safety. Six counts

were chalked up for the Reds in the second stanza off three hits and three costly Roseburg misplays. In the third canto the Chiefs again failed to hit Bob Caviness, former U. of O. varsity hurler, while Eugene scored an additional run off three walks and an error.

Dick DeBernardi, U. of O. junior-varsity pitcher and Chief first-sacker, took over Bill Stradley's mound slot in the fourth and held the Reds for the rest of the fray to a single hit and run.

Play greatly improved for the Chiefs upon DeBernardi's move to the hill as Vonie Baker led off with a single to leftfield. George Sanders walked, and DeBernardi singled to score Baker.

In the sixth Jerry Huggins binged to get on, but a pop fly and a K. O. by Pitcher Bob Rehberg retined the side.

A valiant attempt to catch up on the scoreboard was made in the seventh by Roseburg as Lowell Atterbury, getting on by way of a walk, moved to third off Stradley's single, finally scoring on a Red misplay.

Rally, Nipped In Ninth

The Chiefs major threat was made in the ninth frame when they filled the sacks with two outs. George Sanders grounded out and DeBernardi was retired on three strikes by Delano Fox.

Brown began the route after getting hit by a wild pitch. Stradley and Virg Sanders following him with singles, and Love Baker, hit by a wild toss, forced in a run. A pop up by V. Baker ended the game.

Sunday the Chiefs resume Southern Oregon League play, meeting Central Point at Finlay Field at 2 P. M., following last week's rained out contest slated with Hill, Calif. The Hill game is expected to be played here July 6.

Savoldi, Cousin of
Famous Joe, Will
Take on LaBelle

Pierre LaBelle, the "Fighting Frenchman" who has advanced to the ranks of challenger in the junior heavyweight division, will set as a "trial horse" at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night when he tests a newcomer with a famous name—Lou Savoldi.

Savoldi, who comes here from Oklahoma, possesses one of the finest physiques in the sport and gained his amazing strength through weight-lifting. He is a cousin of the famous Joe Savoldi and the fine-looking athlete bears the reputation and promise of developing into one of the greatest matmen in the game. LaBelle is certain to make Lou's debut here a rugged one.

Meanies Also Matched
The match will be presented as a preliminary to a promising "grudge battle" between a pair of whiskered villains—Benny Trudell and Stocky Kneilson. Just last week the two matmen were teammates in a tag-team skirmish which they were beaten by LaBelle and Jack Kiser. Trudell, the rugged lumberjack from Canada, claimed that his partner from the hills of Tennessee caused him to carry virtually the entire load—resulting in the loss.

A comparatively mild argument during the progress of the match built up until the two men came to blows in the dressing room, resulting in the challenge bout in which the matmen asked permission to use any hold without disqualification. The Roseburg commission, however, has barred the strange, eye gouging and finger lace.

Feature of the meeting is the agreement that the loser must have his whiskers removed in public—or leave the country. The program is attracting considerable attention and a capacity crowd is anticipated.

Adams bested Olsen and Caster, who gave up eight blows, two of them homers by Ostrowski and Sauer. The Padres scored in the ninth on a last-surge rally that missed with the tying runs on base.

woke up to find themselves third, 13 games off the pace.

The other PCL contest saw the Seattle Rainiers walloping Hollywood, 6-1, and supplanting the Stars in seventh place. Hollywood, of course, fell into the cellar again.
