Sally Butler, Hoosier, teacher and lawyer, flew from her place of business in Indiana to attend state conventions of B. P. W. C. at Seattle, Washington, and Albany, Oregon. Sally Butler is the national president of Business Professional Women's Clubs. It was the first time in a decade the B. P. W. C. of the Oregon Federation could entertain a national president. A formal banquet was held at the Elks Club of Albany, at which time Miss Butler gave a stirring address, "Women's Place in World Affairs." She speaks simply but forcefully. Briefly summarizing the thought of Miss Butler's talk: First, she stressed harmony, but not giving way just to keep peace. Consider carefully first before making a decision and then stay by your guns. Qualifying this statement thus: "Let us not jeopardize our power and influence. In unity and harmony we can have strength and enjoy the respect of our community. Women must work together towards the ideal in which they believe. Business and professional women should be leaders in every community, striving constantly to develop and carry out a program that has as its basic purpose the securing of human rights for every individual. The future of our civilization depends upon the courage with which we meet the problems that face us today."

Before flying to Seattle, in her short talk Saturday morning she stressed careful choosing of representatives of clubs, "remember, one individual will, at times, represent a whole body," she cautioned further, "carry out this idea in all your voting, the people you elect, whether a club, a city officer or governmental position, are representatives."

She stressed the importance of cooperation. No leader can be stronger than the members back of him or her. "In setting goals of achievement, make them high," she said, "set them, not just for women but for mankind. We must recognize the rights of every individual and help make opportunity for everyone. And we must do this not just in words, but in reality."

Report on state convention was part of the business of the regular meeting of the Roseburg B. P. W. C. held at the Roseburg Armory last Monday evening. The president, Alvia Wetherell, Edna Helgeson, Jean Whittenburg, Mildred Herman, Mattie Gosnell and Vivian Logsdon attended the state convention held at Albany the last of May.

Albany home town of the state president, Kathleen Miller, and the state corresponding secretary, Irene Graham, and convention chairman, cooperated to the fullest extent with the local B. P. W. C. Club to house, dine and entertain some 450 delegates to the state meet. It is no small task for a small city the size of Albany, much smaller than Roseburg, to royally entertain, as they did, this convention. Every business man and homeowner cooperated to the fullest extent to make a success of such an undertaking of entertainment.
