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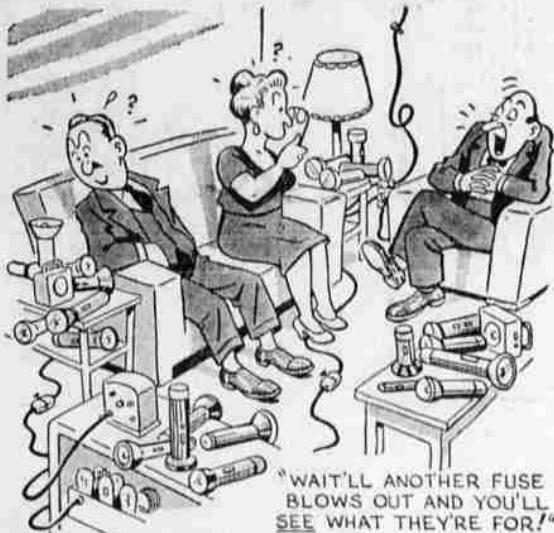
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Chiefs Scheduled

Southern Oregon League baseball resumes play Sunday, weather permitting, with Roseburg's Umpqua Chiefs playing host to Central Point on Finlay Field at 2 P.M., and Tri-City's aggregation entertaining Medford's Rockies at the South Douglas County diamond.

Other league action sees Crescent City at Hill and Grants Pass at Ashland.

Suffering from a four-game slump, one of which was a conference contest, the Chiefs hope to get back their high-flying pre-season form against the Pointers tomorrow.

Central Point, led by the Wilkinson and George Gitzen battery, opened conference play defeating Hill, 6-2, on the Californians' diamond. Pitcher Wilkinson, tossing live-hit ball, struck out 13 opponents, while his team chalked up four runs on six bingles in a single frame. Gitzen led by slamming three hits in four times at bat.

Chiefs' Coach H. H. Turner has been experimenting with his crew of six hurlers, at the same time giving them all valuable experience in no-no exhibition games. Roy Long, ace moundman of last year's championship nine, is expected to get the starting nod against the Pointers. The roster of hurlers include Bill Stradley, Bart Bartholomew, Ike Seibert, Cliff Bryant, Vonnice Baker and Long.

(Associated Press Sports Writer) Brooklyn yesterday took a half game lead in the wild National League scramble by defeating New York, 6-2, breaking out of a tie with the New York Giants who had moved up even with the Dodgers in an 11-inning win over St. Louis, 7-4.

English Derby Won
By 40-to-1 Horse

ESPSOM DOWNS, June 7.—(AP) Pearl Diver, a 40 to 1 French horse owned by Baron G. De Waldner, scored an astonishing four-length victory in the 188th running of the English Derby today as the shortest priced favorite in more than a decade—Tudor Minstrel—finished out of the money.

Backed down to 4 to 7 and virtually conceded the \$38,404 winner's pot in all the pre-race speculation, Tudor Minstrel ended a faltering fourth, carrying with him, in defeat once more, Gordon Richards, who is the world champion of jockeys, but has never won a Derby.

Behind the flying French winner were Migoli, 100-6 shot who was the Aga Khan's hope for a fourth Derby triumph, and Sayajirao, the \$117,600 purchase of the Maharaja of Baroda, highest-priced yearling in turf history, then the favorite.

Jockey G. Bridgeland drove Pearl Diver to his smashing victory in this field of 15.

Civic Row Causes
U. of O. Man to
Spurn Seattle Job

SEATTLE, June 7.—(AP)—The long search for a superintendent of the Seattle Park Department, a \$7,200-a-year position vacant since its creation two years ago, apparently must start all over again, James A. Gibbs, president of the Seattle Park Board, said today.

His comment came after C. Ken Weidner, Eugene, Ore., former Navy captain who has returned to his post as plant superintendent for the University of Oregon, refused to accept the position. The refusal, Mayor William F. Devin charged yesterday, was because of a letter five park department officials wrote April 5.

The letter, the mayor said, accused the park board of violating municipal civil service regulations in selecting Weidner for the job.

Indignant, the mayor called an emergency meeting of the park board yesterday, and charged the five men were guilty of "gross insubordination" and their action "inexcusable." He demanded the men retract their statements and apologize in writing.

Later, the men met and drafted a letter to the mayor and Gibbs which a spokesman said "should satisfy all concerned." They declined to reveal its contents and Gibbs, also refusing to make it public, said it would be taken up by the park board next Thursday.
