'Dream Home' on Wheels Halts in Roseburg for Public Inspection



An ingeniously-built, motorized five-room bungalow, the "World's Greatest Motor Dream Home" of Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Watts, is on exhibition today on N. Stephens St., near the Junior High School.

Mrs. Watts, the former Mona Throckmorton, attended Roseburg schools in 1907, 1908 and 1909 and spent yesterday evening renewing old acquaintances.

The equal of a modern, five-room house, with two private bedrooms, a bath, a kitchen and a combination living room-dining room, the luxurious ark was constructed by the Watts in their Los Angeles backyard as a place to store their furniture and belongings, following eviction from a rented home.

Spending two years and approximately \$9,000 building their house on wheels, the Watts did all the work by hand. A good knowledge of carpentry and sheer ingenuity helped. And they worked after spending 10 hours a day at a machine shop during the war.

En route to Seattle to visit friends and then on to Canada, the Watts have traveled an approximately 8,000 miles thus far, having toured Northern Mexico prior to starting on their current Pacific Northwest jaunt.

Watts is pilot of the vehicular house, which consists of a 120 H. P. Chrysler powered cab-over-engine 15-ton truck and trailer, measuring 60 feet in length.

Electrically Equipped
Pathe Newsreel recently filmed the "Dream Home" and named it "the only complete home on wheels."

The truck carries four butane tanks holding 86 gallons and has its own electric power plant to provide lights and power for the refrigerator, electric mixer, toaster, and fruit juicer. All except the power plant, controls, wheels and chassis were built from raw materials to Watts' own specifications.

The kitchen, more than 20 feet

long and eight feet wide, is equipped with a regular butane gas stove, an electric refrigerator, a double sink and several built-in cabinets, all constructed by Watts. A separate laundry compartment is provided in this house on wheels, which includes an electric washer, tub and shower, with both hot and cold running water, are in the bathroom.

The living room is fully equipped with modern, standard-sized furniture. The dining table is adorned with a vase of flowers, which have ridden freely from the California border without tipping or spilling a drop of water.

No Travel Disturbance
Mrs. Watts says she can comfortably pour coffee while the truck is moving at 35 miles per hour without spilling a drop. Because of the weight and exceptional balance of the movable home, a minimum of swaying and maximum smooth riding is attained. Floor lamps and even dishes are transported without support.

Interior of the home is of rock-wool insulation and the lights are fluorescent lights throughout.

Non-commercial, there is no charge to visit the home, although contributions, used to finance the exhibition and trip are accepted, according to the hosts.

At San Bernardino's Orange Show, where the Watts went as sightseers, more than 50,000 persons passed through the home on an inspection tour, wearing out the Watts expensive rugs and causing what Watts termed, "No end of house work for my wife."

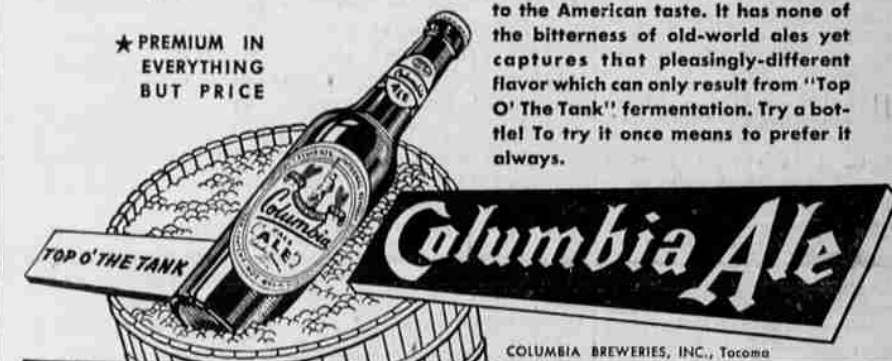

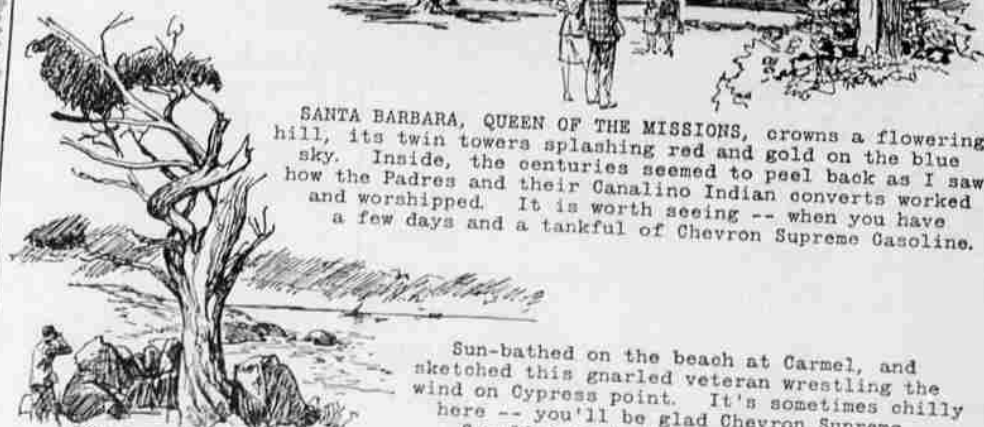
