9 School Districts To Vote on Merger

Residents of Oakland School District, No. 1, will meet at the Oakland School Wednesday night to discuss the proposal to consolidate the Oakland and Sutherland school districts. It was announced today.

Lester Wilcox of the State Department of Education will speak at the meeting.

Proposed consolidation of nine school districts of the Oakland-Sutherland area will be put to a public vote next Saturday, June 14.

The proposal before the people is to consolidate the following districts into one Class A district: District No. 1, Oakland; No. 2, Wilbur; No. 27, Nonpareil; No. 39, Fir Grove; No. 122, Fair Oaks; No. 130, Sutherland, and Coles Valley. Day and Millwood, now consolidated.

Supporters of the consolidation have listed the following advantages to such a proposal:

1. Construction and furnishing of a conveniently located six-year high school.

2. Continuing the operation of the present elementary schools for children through the sixth grade, thus alleviating the present crowded conditions.

3. Placing the area on a sound financial basis.

4. Improving the educational facilities for all students involved.

5. Low per-pupil cost.

6. A wider selection of courses conducted by specialized instructors.

The plan, to be voted on in each of the nine districts, calls for a five-man school board to be elected. Also a five-man budget committee is to be appointed, allowing for an equitable distribution of representation for all districts.

Four Appointed to Forestry Service

Appointment of four men to positions on the Umpqua National Forest was announced today by M. M. Nelson, forest supervisor. Walter G. Holbrook will become timber management assistant for the Bohemia Ranger District. Holbrook was graduated as a logging engineer from Oregon State College. He served as a lieutenant in the recent war and lately has been employed by the Mist Logging Co.

Three undergraduates in forestry at Oregon State College have summer season appointments. They include: Leroy Bond, scaler for South Umpqua Ranger District, Tillamook; formerly employed at Steamboat Guard Station.

William Ragland, scaler for North Umpqua District, Wolf Creek Training Camp, to scale logs in the Little River area.

Spencer Trotter, cruiser for Diamond Lake and North Umpqua District, Big Camas Ranger Station.

Umpqua Included In Urge for Funds For Flood Control

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—Two Oregon congressmen urged a House Appropriations Subcommittee today to provide ample funds for continuing flood control measures in the Willamette River basin in Oregon.

Reps. Angell and Norblad, Republicans, told the committee on War Department civil functions completion of the program is necessary to combat severe flood losses.

"The construction and operation of the seven reservoirs authorized in the comprehensive plan will reduce floods through a 150-mile reach of the Willamette River," Angell said.

"It will allay the fear of flooding for about 300,000 people residing in the flood plains, reduce the loss of life and enable additional economic development and increased agricultural activity on approximately 500,000 acres now subject to flooding."

He said the floods remove rich top soil in the valley and deposit gravel and debris as deep as four feet.

Umpqua Included

He urged the committee to appropriate ample funds for McNary dam the Bonneville dam, the Columbia River from Vancouver to The Dalles, the Columbia and lower Willamette Rivers, the channel of the Willamette, the Columbia at the mouth, Coos Bay and river, Umpqua River, De Pau Bay, Skipanon Channel, Coquille River, Westport Slough, Yaquina Bay, Tillamook Bay and harbor, Dorena reservoir, Detroit reservoir, Lookout Point reservoir and bank protection for the Willamette River.

Norblad told the committee the benefits of improving the Willamette basin will far exceed the costs.

"A long-range survey of the damage which has been done in that area from floods since 1900 alone is in excess of the total proposed cost of the entire project," Norblad said.

"The Willamette Valley has some of the most fertile soil in the United States and each year millions of dollars of valuable land is washed away and lost forever to the people of this country."

The actual dollar loss in 1946 is estimated at \$6,000,000, while 1945 the figure was \$9,800,000.

"Certainly Congress cannot afford to do otherwise than to make adequate appropriations for it."

Seattle Group to Climb Peaks Near Diamond Lake

Officials of the Umpqua National Forest are making plans to welcome approximately 75 members of the Seattle Mountaineers Club, who will camp at Diamond Lake Aug. 4-7, and climb two nearby peaks, Mt. Thielsen and Mt. Bailey.

The mountain climbers will travel in an automobile caravan on a two weeks' trip through Oregon. They will camp at Mt. Hood on the Timberline Highway and in McKenzie Pass before coming to Diamond Lake. They will return by way of the Oregon Caves and the Oregon Coast Highway.

Camp facilities at the south end of Diamond Lake will be reserved for the party, said M. M. Nelson, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest. While the mountaineers climb the two peaks, their families will visit Crater Lake and other points of interest.

Mt. Thielsen, in the Cascade Range east of Diamond Lake, is 9,173 feet above sea level. It is one of eight or 10 mountains in Oregon for which permits are required before an ascent is made.

The permits are issued at the Diamond Lake Guard Station. Mt. Bailey, west of Diamond Lake, has an altitude of 8,363 feet. It is not as hazardous a peak to climb as Mt. Thielsen, Nelson said.

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Electrical Workers Put Off Officers' Election

Election of officers scheduled for June 16 by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local No. 659, has been postponed until June 23. It was announced today by Robert Tower, chairman.

The order postponing the election, Tower said, was made by Charles Cray, business manager, Medford. The election will be held on the 23rd at 8 P. M. in Hall A, basement of the Pacific Building. Officers will be named for a two-year period.

Regular meetings will be held by the wiremen June 16 and by utility workers June 17, Tower said.

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
