Treason Indictment Filed Against Nisei

LOS ANGELES, June 13.—A possible death sentence was the charge on which a federal grand jury indicted Tomoya Kawakita, 25, American-born Japanese accused of torturing American war prisoners while he was their Japanese prison camp foreman.

The indictment was returned Wednesday after a number of witnesses described Kawakita's alleged brutal and degrading treatment of American service men in the Oeyama prisoner of war camp from Aug. 8, 1944, to Aug. 24, 1945.

Kawakita recently was arrested by FBI agents after one of the former prisoners, William L. Bruce of San Luis Obispo, Calif., recognized him in a department store here. He had returned to this country upon representation that he attended a Japanese school during the war effort and had no part in the war effort.
