Wallace Wins Right to Talk in U. S.-Owned Hall

bership of Congress that until our government takes a truly anti-Communist stand here at home, that we in Congress should refuse to appropriate any money to fight Communism abroad," he said.

Wallace, who is crusading against the Truman foreign policy, is expected to discuss his views on peace and perhaps also clarify his position in the 1948 presidential campaign.

His speech is being sponsored by the Southern Conference for Human Welfare, which was described by the House Committee on Un-American Activities in a formal report this week-end as a Communist front organization.

Denies Free Speech at Issue

Franklin T. Miles, attorney representing the anti-Communist association, argued before the judge that the granting of a permit for Wallace to speak "violated" the spirit of President Truman's executive order against al-

lowing Communists to hold government jobs.

Miles said the issue of free speech was not involved.

The whole point, he contended, was whether the government should allow a federal facility to be used "by a group sympathetic with those who advocated overthrow of our government by force."

Miles told the court the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars were a stand in the case, but Justice Proctor said statements from the two organizations would not be necessary. Proctor gave the reply when Wendell L. McConnell, representing the Association for the Advancement of Colored people, said he wanted to be heard as a friend of the court.

Daniel Maher, assistant U. S. attorney, appearing on behalf of the Justice department, opposed granting of the anti-Communist association's petition.

Attorney General Tom Clark issued a statement saying the department opposed it "because one of the greatest responsibilities of the Department of Justice is to protect the freedom of speech guaranteed under the Constitution and the Bill of Rights."

"While I may not be in accord with Mr. Wallace's views," Clark said, "yet under our constitution and the Bill of Rights he has a right to express his opinion. If we commence to abridge such rights, we are violating a principle on which our government was founded and has stood for over 170 years."

Wallace Tells Views

The former vice president told

a news conference here yesterday that the United States and Britain "would" and "should" fight Russia if the Soviet Union tried to expand southward into Turkey near the Arabian oil fields.

He declared the Soviets should be told this. But he added he has no evidence that Russia would try that and he hopes she wouldn't.

Later Wallace withdrew the

words "should fight" and said he meant to say only that the United States and Britain "would fight" under those circumstances. He told reporters he will have more to say tonight on (1) how he thinks an "enduring peace" can be achieved and (2) what he intends to do in the next presidential campaign.

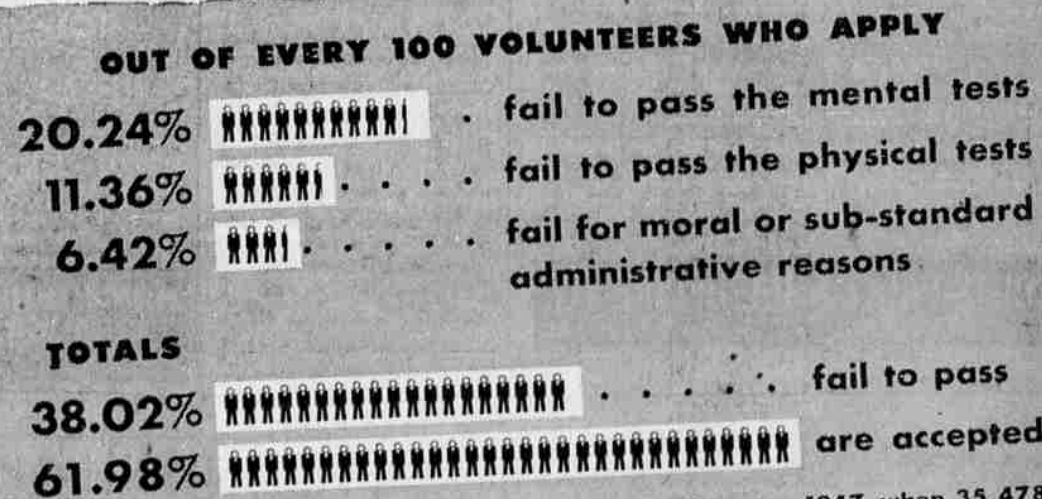

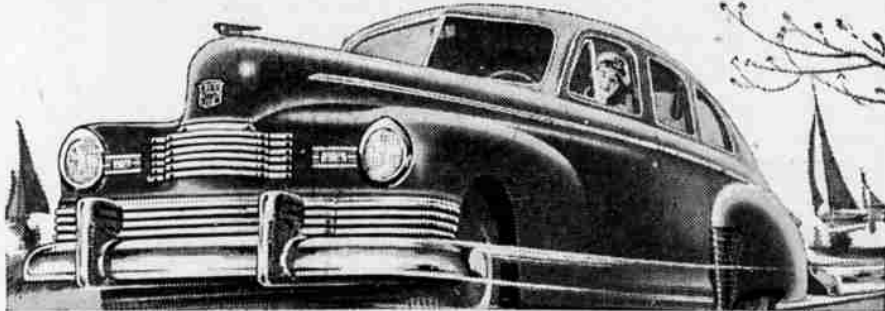
