House Votes Freeze of Social Security Tax Rate

WASHINGTON, June 18.—(AP)—The House passed unanimously today a bill freezing the Social Security payroll tax at present rates for two years.

If passed by the Senate and accepted by President Truman the measure will block an automatic \$2,000,000,000 annual increase in the levy on January 1. The legislation provides, however, for an increase in the tax in 1950 to form one per cent to 1.5 per cent each against employer's pay and employees' payrolls. In 1957 the tax would jump to two per cent against each.

Without the freeze, the levy would have increased January 1 to 2.5 per cent against employer and employee. The present one per cent tax collects about \$1,500,000,000 annually for the Social Security old age and survivors insurance program.

Rent Control Extension Terms Accepted by House
WASHINGTON, June 18.—(AP)—The House accepted yesterday a joint Congressional Committee's recommendations on the terms of a measure to extend rent control until Feb. 29, 1948.

The legislation now goes to the Senate.

Included in the bill is a controversial provision permitting a 15 per cent hike in rents when landlords and tenants "voluntarily" get together "in good faith" and agree to the boost in exchange for a lease through 1948.

The measure also would free building materials from controls except for amusement and recreational construction.

Rent controls would expire automatically June 30 unless Congress acts—a point which Rep. Monroney (D-Okla.) made in terming the bill "thoroughly bad" but adding that he was going to vote for it.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Roseburg Funeral Home Thursday, June 19, at 2 P. M. with Dr. Morris Beach officiating. Interment will be in the Odd Fellows Cemetery of Roseburg.
