Cardinal Cast-Off Hurler Now Winner For Boston Braves

Charlie Barrett, who is being hailed as the number one "comeback" of 1947, today owes his success to his remarkable control pitching.

The rambunctious redhead, whose decline from a 23-game winner in 1945 to a three-time loser last season caused his banishment from the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals to the Boston Braves last winter, currently is the hottest hurler in the majors. Including yesterday's 11-1 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds, Barrett has won five straight to bring his season record to six wins and three defeats.

The Braves' one-sided triumph, their fourth straight, increased their first place margin in the National League pennant race to a full game over the runner-up New York Giants. First Baseman Torgerson got two singles to drive in three Boston runs.

Cardinals Still Spurring

The upsurging St. Louis Cardinals gained their sixth consecutive victory last night when they came from behind with a three-run uprising in the last of the ninth to eke out a 7-5 triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies. A triple by Musial with the bases loaded and one out brought in the runs. The win put the Cards into fifth place, five and a half games off the pace.

Scheib, 20-year-old right hander, pitched his second complete game of his career in organized baseball and for the second time in a week defeated the Detroit Tigers as the Philadelphia Athletics won 5-2.

Feller Whiffs Nine

Feller fanned nine batters to raise his season total to 96 and pitched the Cleveland Indians to a 5-3 victory over the Washington Senators.

The defending American League champion Boston Red Sox registered their seventh victory in a row by defeating the St. Louis Browns, 6-5. The win put the Sox in undisputed possession of second place, one game behind the New York Yankees.

The scheduled game between the Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates was postponed by rain as was the game between Brooklyn and the Cubs. The Yankees and Chicago White Sox were not scheduled.

Kneilson, Ross to Battle in Next Mat Headliner

Stocky Kneilson, the bearded hillbilly from Tennessee who "chased" Benny Trudell out of the country, has been signed to meet tough Tony Ross in the headline attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly wrestling show at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night.

Owen has also signed an attractive semi-final bout between Al Szasz, the aggressive Hungarian, and Jack Carter, the piling expert from Australia.

The Kneilson-Ross bout should be a bloody brawl with both grapplers aiming for a shot at Buck Weaver's Pacific coast junior heavyweight championship. Both have registered impressive decisions recently over Herb Parks, from whom Weaver won the championship a few weeks ago.

Kneilson is one of the most rugged villains now appearing in the Pacific Northwest, but he will be meeting a formidable foe in Ross, an experienced miltman who at one time held the welterweight championship of the Southeastern States.

The headliner should be backed with dynamite and regardless of the result, Douglas County mat followers should see one of the most torrid matches of the season.

The well-balanced show promises of attract a near-capacity

crowd and local fans are urged to make early reservations for ringside seats. The opener will get under way at 8 P. M., a half hour earlier than usual, because of a dance scheduled at the Armory later in the evening.

Portland was leading the Oaks 6-1, Vince DiMaggio having homered in the Oakland run in the sixth, when the last-of-the-ninth uproar occurred, giving Oakland an 8-6 win.

Up to that time Portland had sailed along like a cinch winner. Their starting pitcher, Helsar, left amid the last inning bombardment, and Liska couldn't stop the Oaks, either. The third Beaver pitcher, Moity, pitched to only one man but unfortunately it was DiMaggio, who blasted his second home run of the game.

San Francisco wallowed Sacramento, 10-3, getting all its runs in the first three innings included a six-run first inning cluster. Melton pitched his sixth victory while Sacramento used five pitchers fruitlessly.

The Los Angeles Angels had an easy time of it in slinking San Diego, 10-2. The Angels catcher Gillespie homered in the sixth with two on and again in the seventh with one on.

Seventh place Hollywood dropped Seattle deeper into the cellar, 8-5. Kelleher's homer with two on base in the third and a four-run spurge in the eighth featured the Stars' 10-hit attack on four Rainier pitchers.
