V. F. W. Chief Backs Truman's Policy

WALLA WALLA, June 19. — (AP) — Support of President Truman's policy of firmness toward Russia and aid to small countries against the encroachment of Communism was expressed here today by Louis E. Starr of Portland, national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, at a press conference opening the annual Washington state encampment of the order here.

Starr also urged active support for a program of universal military training in this country as a national defense measure as well as a necessary backing for Secretary of State Marshall in the nation's foreign policy program.

"The United States is closer to war today than at any time in the past 50 years, closer than in the fall of 1941 up to the time of the Pearl Harbor attack," Starr stated.

"There is only one way in which we can prevent war, and that is to keep ourselves strong and to assist other countries of the world in keeping themselves strong to resist the encroachments of predatory nations."

"It is far better that the United States become financially bankrupt in the act of helping these little countries, as well as the nations of South America, than to become embroiled in another war. For the next war will be the last war."

Property Owners Told to Remove Weeds and Grass

Due to the fire hazard created by the heavy growth of weeds and grass during the recent rains, Chief of Police O. A. Kennedy today told property owners of the city ordinance which requires removal of all weeds, grass, and vines on vacant lots that constitute fire hazards, and forbids piling of lumber and wood in alleys.

After July 1, violators of the ordinance will be issued warrants citing them into court, to compel them to remove all such fire hazards, the police chief said.

Truman-Stalin Huddle Now Not Regarded Timely

Former Vice President Henry A. Wallace's proposal that President Truman invite Premier Stalin to a Berlin conference, a "first step" to guarantee world peace, has encountered cautious silence of opinion over most of the globe, a notable exception being the emphatic approval voiced in the Soviet-licensed newspaper "Nacht Express" in Berlin.

Not so long ago such a move by the president might have been hailed as a grand idea. But the situation recently has developed such ugly angles that any suggestion of Mr. Truman taking the initiative in inviting the generalissimo to a two-man parley certainly would call for much burning of midnight oil before it was adopted. There has been the Red coup in Hungary, resulting in the overthrow of the democratic government and the substitution of a Communist regime. There have been other developments in numerous countries, including the United States, indicating that aggressive Communism is on the march.

Dulles Voices Warning
John Foster Dulles, state department adviser, in a speech yesterday at Northwestern University declared that the Russian policy of setting up "polic states" may "lead to widespread violence and even war." He said there is no reason to believe "that the effort of Soviet leaders to impose widely their systems of government will stop of their own accord." And the U. S. army is having printed for distribution to troops a pamphlet which says the Communist party in America is an agent of Russia and that Communism is a danger to democracy.

With this (and much more) as background, it's easy to see that an invitation from President Truman right now might be mistaken as a rush to appeasement. Should such an erroneous impression be created, the repercussions both at home and abroad might be serious.

However, without attempting to read Mr. Truman's mind one ventures the view that he would be delighted if Premier Stalin should feel able to accept invitations already extended to him to visit Washington. The president

revealed a year ago that Stalin had declined two invitations with regret, saying his doctors wouldn't let him make long trips. For that matter, there seems no reason to believe Mr. Truman wouldn't accept an invitation from the Soviet premier for a conference in Berlin or some other European city. The premier, it may be noted, isn't laboring under any situation which might give rise to a suggestion of appeasement on his part.

Hearing Dated On Phone Rates Hike

A hearing on proposed rate increases of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. will be held at 10 A. M. Monday, July 7, in Room 321 of the State Capitol Building, Salem, by order of Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg.

The telephone company filed its proposed rate schedule with the PUC on April 28. It was to become effective May 28. It was suspended for six months by order of the PUC pending an investigation and hearing.

The proposed rate changes embodied increases totaling \$1,555,000 annually for the company in Oregon. On June 10, a further filing was made by the telephone company providing for additional revision in their schedules.

The additional filing embodied an increase in miscellaneous charges and intrastate toll rates in the amount of \$669,999 annually, bringing the grand total of requested increases for the State of Oregon to \$2,224,999. The revised schedules also have been suspended six months.

Alonso M. Boyden, War Veteran, Passes Away

Alonso M. Boyden, 68, veteran of the Philippine Insurrection, died at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital June 16. He was born May 4, 1879, at Ogdensburg, Wis., and was a woolen mill worker in civil life. He was admitted to the hospital from Orting, Wash.

Surviving is a brother, Dr. Frank Boyden, Astoria, Ore. Funeral services were held today at the Veterans Cemetery. Arrangements were in charge of the Long & Orr Mortuary.

Law Copies Now Offered to Vets

Twenty new laws affecting war veterans, passed in the recent session of the Oregon legislature, have been published in pamphlet form and will be ready for distribution some time this week to interested organizations and individuals, W. F. Garrenstrom, newly appointed state director of Veterans' Affairs, announced.

The pamphlets, 5000 of them, are titled, "Supplement to Veterans' Laws of the State of Oregon." They are available, free, at

the Salem office of the veterans' department in the State Library building, Salem, and the Portland office at 416 S. W. 11th Avenue.

Most important of the new laws are amendments to the state veterans' loan act for the purchase of farms and homes, which provides a \$8000 maximum loan, and to the state educational aid act which gives Oregon veterans not already studying under the GI bill a maximum of \$35 a month up to 36 months while studying in academic or vocational schools.

Another act included in the pamphlet is an amendment to the state apprenticeship law to

provide war veteran representation on both state and local apprenticeship councils.
