Fee Schedule for Nurses Announced

A new schedule of employment standards and policies, including fees, for private-duty nurses has been adopted by the board of directors, Oregon State Nurses' Association, effective as of May 1, 1947.

Fees to be charged by private nurses for each eight-hour day include \$10 for medical and surgical cases; \$12 for communicable diseases, alcohol, mental and narcotic cases; \$7 each for patients in multiple nursing cases; \$13 for obstetrical cases where both mother and baby require care, or \$10 if only the mother needs attention.

The overtime charge to be made for each additional hour or fraction, day or night over the eight-hour schedule was listed as \$1.25 for cases in the \$10 bracket. Other overtime cases listed will be \$2.50 for the first hour; \$2.50 for the second hour; \$1.50 for the third hour and \$1.50 for the fourth hour, with a limit of four hours.

A pamphlet published by the association announcing the new standards said a private duty nurse must be fully qualified professionally and in good physical health, and have "a definite preference for bedside nursing."

Muskats Top Take of Oregon's Fur-Bearers

PORTLAND, June 20.—(AP)—More than 77,000 muskrats were trapped in Oregon in the 1946-47 season by 2483 licensed trappers, the State Game Commission reported.

The entire fur take brought \$208,876 revenue to the state, the commission said, with the muskrat total of \$101,066 well in front. However, only 5349 mink yielded \$71,569. The two other leading species taken were racoon, 3738 with \$3,625 in revenue and 1138 returning \$19,437.

Counties yielding the highest returns: Harney \$23,183; Klamath \$16,849; Lane \$14,296; Clatsop \$13,809; Malheur \$13,149; Douglas \$11,306; Baker \$10,908; Jackson \$9,749.

The figures do not include many of the predators taken by hunters the year around, but only those classified as fur-bearers, the report said.

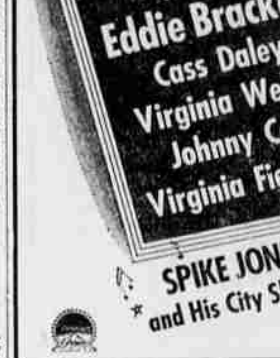
