

Soviet Paper Hits Back Heavily at Acheson's Charge

MOSCOW, June 20.—(AP)—The Communist newspaper Pravda yesterday termed the Western speech of retiring Undersecretary of State Dean Acheson a "gross and rude slander against the Soviet Union."

Acheson declared Sunday that Russia was retarding world recovery by steps in conflict with the "very premises" needed for international accord.

The article in Pravda was the sharpest attack yet on U. S. foreign policy in the Russian press. "Acheson knows very well with what distrust progressive circles throughout the world appraise American foreign policy and this includes appraisal in the United States, too," it said.

"The cynicism of dollar atomic diplomacy, the greed of American monopolies and the greed of unchecked expansion covered by the figleaf Truman doctrine has liquidated without the faintest traces of prestige of American foreign policy won by Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Pravda said Acheson "does not want to admit responsibility for the situation rests greatly on those American politicians and diplomats who have become loud-speakers and conductors of deep-

ly anti-Democratic tendencies dangerous for the world."

Saying Acheson sought to place blame on the U.S.S.R., Pravda continued:

"One should know this kind of thing is not original. Acheson has had a few predecessors, especially in the nations of the former Axis. Acheson may be characterized as in the category of persons Elliott Roosevelt refers to in his book as seeking intentionally to ruin the unity which the great powers formed during the war. 'Acheson and his masters apparently feel' that supplies sent to the Soviet Union during the war were 'some sort of advance payment or some financial and political investment which will allow American imperialism to have some effect on Soviet politics or even give it the right to dictate to the Soviet Union on how to behave...' it said.

Nebraska Woman Dies on Trip to Diamond Lake

Surviving are the widower, Watson H. Gillette, Holdrege, Neb.; one son, Willis H. Gillette, Oakland, Calif.; and one daughter, Mrs. Phyllis S. Adams, Geneva, Ill.

Also surviving are two sons, Frances Speake, Gaston, Ore., and Mrs. Carrie Williams, Long Island, Kans. Two grandchildren also survive.

Mrs. Gillette was a member of the Presbyterian Church. The body has been removed to the Long & Orr Mortuary and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Veto of Labor Measure Overridden by House

House-Congress teamwork on domestic affairs.

Mr. Truman summed up his displeasure of the labor bill in five terse sentences:

"The bill taken as a whole would reverse the basic direction of our national labor policy, inject the government into private economic affairs on an unprecedented scale, and conflict with important principles of our democratic society."

"It's provisions would cause more strikes, not fewer."

"It would contribute neither to industrial peace nor to economic stability and progress."

"It would be a dangerous strike in the direction of a totally managed economy."

"It contains seeds of discord which would plague this nation for years to come."

As for the measure's ban against recognition of unions with Communist leaders, the President said that would play into the hands of the Communists.

"The only result of this provision," he said, "would be confusion and disorder which is exactly the result the Communists desire."

"Threat to Democracy"

The fundamental test to be applied to the Taft-Hartley bill, Mr. Truman said, is whether in the "present critical hour" it would "strengthen or weaken American Democracy."

This was his judgment: "I have concluded that the bill is a clear threat to the successful working of our Democratic society."

The president capped his blast against the measure with an invitation for the legislators to try their hand with a wholly new bill.

Mr. Truman said they still had genuine opportunity to enact "appropriate labor legislation" and called attention to recommendations he made last January. These were for a measure prohibiting jurisdictional strikes and secondary boycotts (for unjustifiable objectives) and for creation of a commission to study the need of other labor law objectives.

Advice Disregarded

Republican backers of the bill brushed aside Mr. Truman's counsel as they called for the House, and later the Senate, to enact it over his disapproval.

As soon as the president's message reached the House, Rep. Hartley, chairman of the House Labor committee and one of the bill's authors, told reporters:

"Certainly we aren't going to pass another bill as Mr. Truman suggested. The things he asked, insignificant as they are, are in the bill. And the bill is going to be law, veto or no veto."

Hartley said the president's criticisms prove that if there are any defects in the bill, "it is not because it is too drastic or comprehensive, but not comprehensive enough."

House Republican Leader Hallett of Indiana accused the president of having "definitely lined up with the radical element of the Democratic party" by vetoing the bill, he said.

"He (the president) has turned his back on the regular Democrats who had hoped that the radicals would not continue to control the party."

Hallett noted that 103 House Democrats voted for the bill when the House passed it, while 66 Democrats opposed it. In this minority, Hallett said, were "radical new dealers."

"Henry Wallace need not worry any more about forming a third party," Hallett added. "In his veto message, Mr. Truman practically turned the Democratic party over to Wallace and his gang."

Here are the major provisions of the bill:

1. Let the government get court orders to block "national calamity" strikes, as in the coal or steel industries, during 90 days of mediation.

2. Forbid the closed shop, in which the boss can hire only union help.

3. Ban various kinds of special strikes and boycotts.

4. Permit court suits against unions that break contracts.

5. Deny collective bargaining rights to any union having as an officer a Communist or sympathizer, or anyone who could "reasonably be regarded as one."

6. Make it an unfair labor practice, which could be stopped by a court order, for a union to keep non-striking workers from their jobs by mass or violent picketing.

7. Forbid "excessive or discriminatory" union dues and initiation fees.

National Unity Periled

In his 5,000-word message to Congress, the president declared: "This bill would go far toward weakening our trade union movement, and it would go far toward destroying our national unity."

"By raising barriers between labor and management and by injecting political considerations into normal economic decisions, it would invite them to gain their ends through direct political action."

"I think it would be exceedingly dangerous to our country to develop a class basis for political action."

The president said there still is a genuine opportunity for en-

actment at this session" of appropriate labor legislation," and added:

"It still feels that the recommendations which I expressed in the state of the union message constitute an adequate basis for legislation which is moderate in spirit and which relates to known abuses."

In that message in January, the president said he recommended "a step-by-step approach" and indicated specifically problems which should be handled immediately. He also proposed a non-partisan investigation covering the entire field of labor-management legislation.

Today's action swept away any remnants of White House-Congress cooperation in the domestic field that had survived last Monday's veto of the tax reduction bill.

Disagreeing with the whole philosophy of the labor measure, the president declared it would be "a dangerous stride in the direction of a totally managed economy" and said "it contains seeds of discord which would plague this nation for years to come."
