Wm. A. Barnes Dies in Roseburg

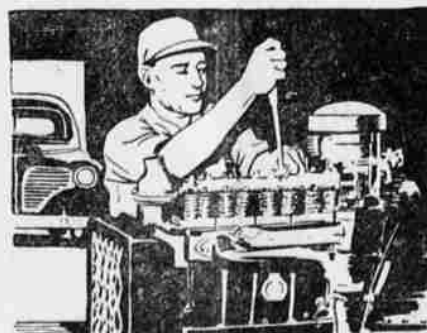

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Soviet 'Travesty' Rapped by Attlee

BARNESLEY, England, June 21. —(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee declared today that "human rights are denied and so-called Democratic government is a travesty" in "several countries of eastern Europe."

"I am convinced that there should be people in this country, and people who profess to be socialists, who appear to condone things that are done by governments that call themselves left, when they would protest vigorously if precisely the same things were done by governments of the right," Attlee said in a speech at a miners' demonstration.

"Freedom of speech, freedom of conscience and personal freedom is the right of the individual whether he is a capitalist or a worker, a conservative, a liberal or socialist," the premier declared.

"Wherever you find the right of opposition denied, wherever you find such devices as the single list of candidates, wherever you find a government that cannot be removed by the method of the ballot box, there is no true democracy, there is no true freedom."

It was the socialist premier's most pointed anti-Russian statement since he told the British trade unions congress last winter that the Soviet government was building a "wall of ignorance" between the Russian people and the west.

In tenor, it was along the lines of Foreign Secretary Bevin's sharp pronouncements about Russia in a House of Commons debate Thursday night.

Observers wondered whether the British government was indirectly serving notice on Russia that Secretary of State Marshall's aid-for-Europe proposals strengthened Britain's hand in international affairs.
