Science Has Built Godless Century. Cleric Declares

SOUTH BEND, Ind., June 24.—(AP)—The Rev. John J. Cavanaugh, president of the University of Notre Dame, told scientists of three nations today that scientists "have made the art and science of moral living the greatest necessity of the modern age."

"The cycle begun by the scientists who once exiled God from society has been completed," Father Cavanaugh said. "Ironically, by their terrifying productions, they have forced God's return."

In a prepared address welcoming 100 American, British and Canadian researchers to a symposium on radiation chemistry and photochemistry, Father Cavanaugh said that "religious, moral and human values must receive special attention" in a world whose fate "lies in the wise management of the scientific devices we already possess."

"I believe that the universities of the world have made a great contribution to mankind by fostering the physical sciences," he said.

"I also believe, however, that the scientists of the nineteenth century did almost irreparable harm by insinuating that the Darwinian hypothesis (the theory of evolution) not only explained everything in the universe, but also explained away God, both as an imminent force and as a Father in Heaven."

Father Cavanaugh added: "Scientists sowed the wind, and we have reaped are still reaping—the whirlwind. Mankind has been infected with a Godless philosophy that is inherently wrong and inherently destructive. Without God, there can be no objective morality. Without objective morality, only might makes right."

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Sportsmen Tilt On Hunting Issue

LA GRANDE, June 24.—(AP)—Delegates from 14 sportsmen's organizations in Eastern Oregon prepared today to battle with "western interests" for establishment of a no-hunting period between deer and elk seasons.

The Eastern Oregon sportsmen's council has framed recommendations for the 1947 hunting season.

"We will have to fight some of the most powerful and prominent men in Oregon," Fred Lanzer, La Grande Sportsmen's Club representative to the council, declared, "and the Game Commission meeting will undoubtedly be packed with lobbyists stumping for an overlapping season. We are going to have to send a powerful enough delegation to that session to offset the western interests."

Western Oregon opposition to the non-overlapping season will, the council anticipates, be based on a desire to bag both a deer and an elk on one trip to Eastern Oregon.

Hunting season dates recommended by the council are: deer, Sept. 20 to Oct. 12; Elk, Nov. 1 to Nov. 23.

17 Cities Set Contests For 'Miss Oregon' Honor

PORTLAND, June 24.—(AP)—Traffic accidents killed two persons in the Portland area last night.

An automobile and a gasoline truck collided in the city, killing Gysler, 67, Portland, plastering contractor, a passenger in the automobile. The driver, Leonard Miggelson, 27, Portland, suffered slight injuries. The truck burst into flame, but its driver, Cliff

Near Gresham an automobile skidded off the Mt. Hood Loop Highway, fatally injuring Mrs. Katie Kalama, of the Warm Springs Indian Reservation. The car was driven by Clifford Barney Tulee, 23, Harrah, Wash., who escaped injury.

Vacation Drivers Admonished to Get 'Sign Habit'

Vacation drivers are being urged to get the "sign habit" by Secretary of State Farrell. Observance of traffic warning signs by travelers all over the nation is being stressed this summer.

Oregon has made a sizable cash outlay to post its highways with adequate warning and guiding signs," the secretary of state said. "Some of our most terrible automobile accidents have stemmed from motorists ignoring these markers."

Diamond-shaped signs indicate hazardous hazards, such as sharp curves, narrow bridges, and dangerous intersections. Rectangular markers are for part-time dangers as crossing livestock. Stop signs are always octagons. Rail crossings are marked by round warnings.

Forest Fire Danger Not Yet Critical in Douglas

Though the weather may be hot, no heat records are likely to be broken in Roseburg today. Weatherman J. C. McCallister said he expected the temperature to average "about 86."

The danger of fire is not yet critical in Douglas County forests. Although a lookout is stationed at Silver Butte, most of the woods are still wet from last week's rains, according to the Douglas Forest Protective Association.

Fire suppression crews of both the Douglas Forest Protective Association and the Umpqua National Forest are engaged in road maintenance and trail improvement work until the danger of forest fires becomes acute.
