Veto of Tax Slash
Bill 'Politics,'
Ellsworth Says

WASHINGTON, June 23.—(AP)—Rep. Harris Ellsworth (R-Ore.) said today that President Truman vetoed the tax reduction bill "for purely political reasons" and, because of it, taxpayers will pay 20 to 30 per cent more taxes next year.

"In vetoing the tax reduction bill," Ellsworth said in a statement, "the president used many words, but the truth of the matter is the president wants tax reduction to take place next year when he is running for re-election."

He reviewed Republican claims that appropriation bills passed by the present House session have "saved \$4,483,916,798" and said that taxes could be reduced \$4,000,000,000 while \$2,500,000,000 could be applied to the public debt and the budget balanced.

"All of this simply means that the Republican program has been, and is being, carried out as promised," Ellsworth said, "but we will have to pay from 20 to 30 per cent more income taxes next year because the president vetoed the tax reduction bill for purely political reasons."

Loan of Plates Scored
Ellsworth amplified a statement he made last week that many members of Congress have lost faith in government departments. Citing the turning over of plates to the Russians for use in printing invasion money, he said: "It is common knowledge that the Russians are printing currency which we are redeeming with dollars. Nearly 800,000,000 of our dollars have been squandered in this way."

"When you realize that one of the objectives of the Russian government is to weaken us economically so we will not have the strength to be a superior power in the world, the enormity of the crime of lending our currency plates can be understood."

Ellsworth also declared while there has been a shortage of box cars in this country the nation has been exporting 5,000 such cars a month and constructing only 4,000 for use at home.

"Lack of proper coordination and balance in the executive departments is to blame for this and numerous other damaging situations," Ellsworth said.

Appointments Made by
State Education Board

SALEM, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—The State Board of Education today appointed William G. Loomis, Salem, now state supervisor of public service training, as supervisor of trade and industries in the State Department of Vocational Education. Loomis succeeds W. D. Purvine, who recently was appointed head of the Oregon

vocational school at Klamath Falls.

The board appointed Elmer Halstead, now with the Salem school system, as supervisor of public service training to succeed Loomis.

The first three instructors for the vocational school were named today. They are I. W. Morris, Oregon City, auto mechanics; Harold C. Rotrock, Oregon City, body and fender work; and Henry Allen Swisegood, Portland, cooks and bakers.

The school is expected to open in about three weeks.

Effect of Foreign
Aid on U. S. to be
Studied by Board

WASHINGTON, June 23.—(AP)—President Truman, going part way with Republican Senator Vandenberg, called for outside help today in weighing America's foreign aid policy with this country's ability to pay.

The chief executive designated 19 leaders of business, labor, agriculture, education and research as a "non-partisan" committee to advise him on how much help can "safely and wisely" be sent abroad.

The implication was plain: that the United States may find it necessary to stem the flow of dollars, food, fuel and materials to war-damaged nations.

The "impact upon our domestic economy" of such aid is of "grave concern to every American," said Mr. Truman's announcement last night, and "merits most careful study."

It was equally clear that the president was making a final effort to prevent the bipartisan foreign policy from piling up in the veto-strewn wreckage of his domestic legislative program.

Mr. Truman took the words "safely and wisely" from the call Vandenberg sounded 10 days ago for a council of Democrats and Republicans to help set the limits within which this government can plan its economic help to foreign nations.

But whether Vandenberg, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, and his Republican colleagues will be satisfied remained to be seen.

BURGLARY IN REVERSE

CHICAGO, June 23.—(AP)—The owner of a liquor store asked police yesterday to help him find the night watchman who broke out of instead of into his establishment.

The proprietor said he hired the night watchman with the understanding that he would be locked in the place from 2 A.M. closing hour until re-opening at 11 A.M.

But the watchman broke out by chopping a hole through the front door and with him went, the owner said, \$500 in cash and a quantity of merchandise.

Million Words
Minute Ability of
New Radio Device

WASHINGTON, June 23.—(AP)—NBC President Niles Trammell said today a new radio communication system has been developed which can send 1,000,000 words a minute.

He said the new system, known as Ultrafax, "could transmit twenty 50,000 word novels from New York to San Francisco in only 60 seconds."

It's so speedy, the National Broadcasting Company head told congress, that present communications methods will seem as "slow as the ox cart compared with a straitliner."

Ultrafax was developed by Radio Corporation of America, and will be ready for a public showing some time this summer. Trammell said this is the way it works:

"Each printed page is treated as a picture and (is) flashed in rapid succession. At the receiving end, the pages are reproduced by a new high-speed photographic process for quick delivery."

Trammell told a Senate interstate and foreign commerce subcommittee that the new process may mean that the newspaper of the future will be delivered by radio.

"Many radio broadcasters of today will become the electronic publishers of tomorrow," he predicted in his prepared testimony. "Radio newspapers will become commonplace. Practically every form of artistic expression will become available to the people direct from studio to home."

That is why, Trammell said, he favors removal of government controls over broadcasting. He thinks a pending bill which the committee is considering to revise the communications act of 1934 would put the spectre of Nazi censorship behind every American broadcaster.

RECORD PRICE FOR STEER

PORTLAND, Ore., June 24.—(AP)—A grain fed choice steer raised by Jack Davis, Ridgefield, Wash., sold on the North Portland livestock market yesterday for an all-time high price of \$28.00 per hundredweight.

Two loads of good and choice fed heifers also sold at a new high of \$25.00.

The Department of Agriculture

livestock reporting service attributed the prices to a strengthened market and higher quality of the animals.

STRENGTH OF O. N. G.

SALEM, Ore., June 24.—(AP)—The strength of Oregon's National Guard now is only 190 officers and 593 enlisted men, National Guard headquarters said today.

The total strength of all National Guard units in the nation is 85,909 men.
