Copco Common Stock Offered

NEW YORK, June 25.—(AP)—Blyth & Co., and associates, offered publicly, at \$22.25 a share, 408,000 shares of California Oregon Power Co. common stock. Of the total, 390,000 shares represented holdings of Standard Gas & Electric Co. and 18,000 shares were for the account of the California Oregon Power Co., which will use the proceeds to reimburse the treasury for expenditures on additions and improvements.

Upon completion of the transaction, California Oregon Power Co. will cease to be a subsidiary of Standard Gas & Electric Co. and will become a separate company. The sale of the stock is being made by the underwriting group on Tuesday, June 24th, at \$22.25 per share. He points out that with the consummation of the sale by Standard Gas & Electric Company the California Oregon Power Company will be 100% investor owned, with no interest or group owning a majority of its stock. Mr. Cummins said that this change is expected to have no effect upon the company's organization or its operating policy.

As Cummins, president of California Oregon Power Co., states that a public offering of this common stock, together with 18,000 shares to be sold by the underwriting group on Tuesday, June 24th, at \$22.25 per share. He points out that with the consummation of the sale by Standard Gas & Electric Company the California Oregon Power Company will be 100% investor owned, with no interest or group owning a majority of its stock. Mr. Cummins said that this change is expected to have no effect upon the company's organization or its operating policy.

Payment Plan Postponed
Mr. Cummins further announced that The California Oregon Power Company has indefinitely postponed its proposed plan to call for payment of its outstanding 6% preferred stock series of 1927, and the sale of a new series of preferred stock, and that the directors yesterday declared the regular quarterly dividend on its preferred stocks payable July 15 to stockholders of record June 30.

Mr. Cummins states that the underwriting group which purchased the common stock has informed him they intend to reserve a certain amount of the issue for territory distribution and suggests that local residents wishing to subscribe should contact their local bank or investment dealers for particulars.

Eighth: By constructing concrete curbs and gutters on both sides of said street.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 19th day of May, 1947; which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.
