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Liquor Board Upheld in Revoking Store's License

SALEM, Ore., June 24.—(AP)—The State Supreme Court ruled today that the Oregon Liquor Control Commission was justified in revoking a retail beer and package store license after it discovered that the holder of the license had a police record.

The decision, which reversed Circuit Judge Tooez of Multnomah County, was in the decision of Lucille and Orville Hart, who operate a beer tavern at 2 N. Killingsworth Ave., in Portland, against the commission.

When Hart applied for his license, he said he had no police

record, so the commission gave him a license. After discovering he had been convicted of auto theft, reckless driving and destruction of property, the commission revoked the license.
