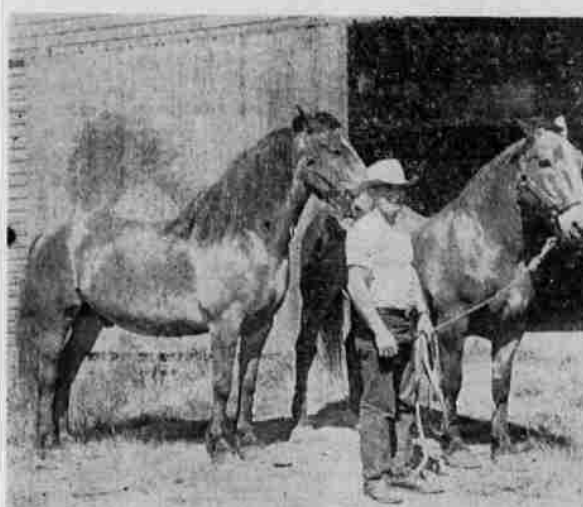

Faithful Horses Displaced by Machinery at Vets Facility After Twelve Years' Service

After twelve years of faithful service at the Roseburg Veterans Facility, "Dick" and "Doc," pictured above, are to be sold. The facility is changing over to mechanized equipment consisting of a garden tractor and power cultivators for use in landscaping and on the farm maintained in connection with the hospital, so the two big bay horses no longer have a place in the system of ground upkeep.

Therefore, orders are that they are to be sold, although those who have worked with them during the time they have been employed will not see them go without regret.

Both Dick and Doc have led an easy life of late, with lots of oats and little work. They are gentle and well broken, and have proved themselves excellent workers when needed, doing their full share toward keeping grounds and gardens both attractive and productive.

An ideally matched team, almost identical in size, color, and markings, they have not been separated since they were brought from Eastern Oregon as three-year-olds, in 1935.

'Commies' Rapped at Legion Meet

PORTLAND, June 27.—(P)—The Rev. Georges M. Bailey, department chaplain, led Oregon Legionnaires in memorial services today after declaring that godless people should be threatened with the atomic bomb.

The Pendleton chaplain told the 29th annual State Legion Convention yesterday that treaties and word of honor mean nothing to "atheistic Communists."

Another Legion speaker, Ray Dorris, national commander of the military order of the Purple Heart, joined Bailey in urging elimination of Communism from this country.

Hugh Bowman, Pendleton, retiring national executive committee member, urged that the executive committee concentrate on a few major pieces of legislation.

Bowman said some measures had come down to defeat because the Legion had been working on too many issues.

Crawford Will Disregard Recall Action of Indians

WASHINGTON, June 27.—(P)—Wade Crawford, tribal delegate of the Klamath Indians in Oregon, said today he will disregard the action of the Klamath council in recalling him from Washington because he considers the action illegal.

Crawford said he was chosen by a secret ballot to represent the tribe in pushing for legislation to liquidate the Klamath reservation.

"The only way I can be removed is by secret ballot," he said. "The action yesterday was the result of pressure exerted by the government's Indian service and the tribe has never voted to recall me in secret ballot."

Crawford charged the Indian service had engineered the tribal meeting yesterday after the business committee, at insistence of the superintendent of the agency, had voted to recall him. He charged that the Indian service had spent tribal funds to take the Indians to the meeting in buses and only 84 tribe members voted for his recall.

"It was not the voice of the Indians," Crawford said, "but that of a meeting packed by the Indian Service. The Indian Service built up a strong political outfit under the New Deal and I find it is operating on most Indian reservations."

Crawford said 275 members of the tribe have signed a resolution asking Congress to pass the legislation for liquidation of the reservation. Bills for that purpose now are before the House and Senate, introduced by Senators Cordon and Morse, Republicans and by Rep. Stockman.

Money Proposed For Flood Control

WASHINGTON, June 27.—(P)—A \$253,000,000 fund for flood control and navigation was proposed to the House today.

This is about \$38,000,000 less than budget estimates submitted to Congress by President Truman last January.

Reflecting agitation for economy in government, the House Appropriations Committee recommended the reduced fund for work on scores of projects during the next 12 months.

Committee leaders urged action on the bill next week although opponents of the slash refused to forego a fight for an increase. There were other members who thought the cut should be greater.

The appropriation for the 12 months ending next Monday was \$308,857,000, approximately the normal peacetime sum provided each year for water projects. Some congressmen contend that the annual appropriation should be at least \$300,000,000 to assure constant utilization of the country's inland waterways.

Others suggested that the \$38,000,000 reduction was moderate and that the Army engineers could increase expenditures if necessary. They have an estimated \$200,000,000 plus "frozen" when project work was halted during the war.

Naval Reserve Erecting Two Quonset Huts

Erection of two quonset huts in the northwest corner of the county fairgrounds, to serve as a Naval Reserve Armory, was started this week, according to Ensign David H. Hill, engineering officer of the local reserve unit.

The huts are steel, 30 x 50 feet in size. One will house radio, communications, and electronics warfare equipment. The second hut will be a shop. When the work of erection is completed, a dedication ceremony will be held.

The huts are being erected, Hill said, by members of the Naval Reserve unit evenings and weekends.

Three more buildings, 40 by 100 feet in size, are expected and will also be erected in the Naval

Reserve leasehold at the fairgrounds, Hill said.

CHINESE MILLIONAIRE
CLINTON, Ill., June 27.—(P)—A check for \$709.63 has been sent to Hong Kong, China, to Miss Vella M. Wilcox, the amount of her share of a Clinton woman's estate.

The check in United States currency was mailed to her by the DeWitt County treasurer, finally settling the estate of Martha E. Hall. Other heirs received their shares five years ago but the war made it impossible to send the money to Miss Wilcox in China. When she gets the check she'll have \$7,056,300—in Chinese money.
