PRESENTED BY CHOIR

A new choral number entitled, "The Word is Like a Garden," written by S. Clarence Trued and inscribed to the First Christian Church choir of Roseburg, was released a short time ago by Schroeders, music publishers of New York.

Dedication of the anthem is to be sponsored by the choir next Sunday evening at 8 P. M. at the Christian Church, at which time an anthem concert will be given. Selections to be rendered come from such masters as Bach, Handel and Tchaikovsky, including some interesting modern anthems. In addition the program will have Georgene Shanklin as piano soloist, the Hahn sisters in a vocal duet and Mrs. Trued on the organ.

Mr. Trued already has to his credit more than forty numbers published, these ranging from piano and vocal solos to full symphonic scores and a cantata. The latter form was written for Warner Bros. in Hollywood and required a full symphony orchestra, a full chorus and a baritone soloist. The work was on a patriotic theme and was dramatized through unison speaking voices from the chorus.

The Rev. Kenneth Knox will have charge of the dedication service, and the public is cordially invited. No admission fee.

State Game Board Sets Hunting Rules Hearing

The Oregon State Game Commission will hold its statutory hearing at ten o'clock, Friday, July 11, in regard to hunting regulations for the current year. The meeting will be held at the offices of the commission at 1634 S. W. Alder Street, Portland.

Analysis of the 1946 hunting and angling license sales show an increase of 131.33 per cent in the number of license holders during the last ten-year period. It is announced by the Oregon State Game Commission. During 1946, there were 344,226 individuals who bought either a hunting or fishing license or both, while in 1936, the total was 148,803.

Anglers exceeded hunters in number as last year there were 199,020 hunting license holders and 242,435 angling licenses.

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New Test Timber Cutting Planned

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—A major experiment in "improvement" timber cutting—the first on a large scale in the Pacific Northwest—is planned under a June 30 bid call issued by the United States Forest Service. Bids will be opened here on 7,560,000 feet of timber, having an appraised value of \$16,284, located on five tracts in the Cascade head experimental forest of the Siuslaw National Forest on the Central Oregon Coast.

Phil A. Briegele, chief of the experiment station's division of management research, said the

cutting will be under supervision of the station with records kept to determine operating costs of various logging methods as well as annual records to show effects of the cutting and growth response of the remaining stand. Some areas will be cleared and in others there will be various types of thinning. He said similar smaller experimental studies are under way in the Deschutes, Siskiyou and Columbia forests.
