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ers' current ten-day vacation ends.

Meanwhile, Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach is preparing, his aides said, to try to bring Lewis and the operators together for negotiations Tuesday—the day after federal control of the mines is ended.

Other Issues Posed

But a UMW spokesman, who said he could "make no comment" on the wage offer, pointed out that "wages and hours don't settle this thing—there are many other issues including some questions raised by the new Taft-Hartley labor act."

Lewis' demands include a 10 cent welfare fund levy on each ton of coal mined, instead of the present 5 cents; six paid holidays, and additional overtime.

Secretary of the Interior Krug estimated that after Sunday only 48,000,000 tons of coal will be in storage above ground, or a 32-day supply.

As the last miners filed out of the pits early today for a 10-day vacation, Krug prepared to give the mines back to the owners when federal authority to run them expires at midnight Monday.

The vacation was provided for in the government contract signed by Lewis and Krug to end the strike 13 months ago. That contract runs out along with federal operation of the properties.

The miners' vacation—shared also by the 75,000 Pennsylvania anthracite workers—may develop into an indefinite holiday if no agreement is reached in the next 10 days.

Labor officials expressed the belief there is still a chance that a contract can be obtained before the deadline, at least by operators from the northern and western coal fields. They represent 75 per cent of the industry and are bargaining together.

The southern operators, who wanted to negotiate separately, are even farther away from settlement than the North-West operators in their bargaining to date.

Strike Would Test Law

Both negotiating conferences broke off while the Taft-Hartley labor bill was pending before President Truman.

Krug told reporters a strike would "afford an opportunity to see what, if anything, the Taft-Hartley act can accomplish."

The new law provides for an injunction against a national emergency strike, but Krug asked if the miners simply stay home July 8 instead of reporting to work without a contract "whom can you enjoin?"

Asked how long the country could stand a coal strike, Krug replied:

How long can you stand on your head? It's a question of how long you have to live."

Krug said Lewis had turned down the Northern and Western operators' offer to give him almost all the terms of the expiring federal contract, plus a substantial wage increase.

PITTSBURGH, June 28.—(AP)—The Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corp. said today that 10,000 workers in its district mills would be furloughed by Monday in the largest mass layoff to date in a coal-dependent industry because of a complete shutdown in the nation's mines for a miners' vacation.

This drastic slash in the Pittsburgh-Youngstown, Ohio, district came as nearly a half million United States coal miners went on a 10-day paid vacation.

The company spokesman was unable to say how long the furloughs of workers would last, nor if there would be additional layoffs.

Presidential Succession Bill Passed by Senate

WASHINGTON, June 28.—(AP)—The Senate yesterday passed, 50 to 35, legislation suggested by President Truman to place the speaker of the House next in line for the presidency in the absence of a vice-president.

The present speaker is Joseph Martin (R-Mass.).

The bill now goes to the House which approved similar legislation in the last congress.

Under its terms, the presiding officer of the Senate would be next in line after the House speaker, with cabinet members following in order after the Secretary of State.

It would alter the present statutory provisions under which the Secretary of State comes after the vice president in the line of succession.
