Rules Listed for Visitors in Forest During Dry Season

Although the June rains have reduced the forest fire hazard temporarily, the summer season of 1947 still could be dangerous, according to Larry Mays, U. S. Forest Service chief of fire control, Portland, Oregon.
"With the early dry spring," said Mays, "it would take but a few days of hot weather and low humidity to bring about bad burning conditions in the forests. Experience has shown that we can expect such periods in July and August."

Bill for Federal Licensing of Auto Drivers Opposed

Any proposal of the Federal Government to move into the field of motor vehicle driver licensing will be strongly opposed by the Oregon State Motor Association, Ralph Coan, director of the association, announces.

Marion T. Bennett (R., Mo.), to establish a motor vehicle division in the Department of Interior. One of the chief functions of the Division, under the bill, would be to issue driving licenses to the nation's 40,000,000 motorists.
