

Tigers Win Twin Bill; Boston Tops National League

Detroit's tough luck Tigers are back in the running today mainly on account of Newhouse's inexplicable jinx over the St. Louis Browns.
Ruel's cellar dwellers bowed to Newhouse's southpaw slants for the 15th straight time yesterday as the Tigers took both ends of the doubleheader, 7-5 and 6-1.
In winning their fourth straight at home, in injury-riddled Bengals climbed into a third place tie with the Philadelphia Athletics.
Trot hung up his seventh triumph in the nightcap before he retired in the sixth inning with a sore arm. Benton finished for the Tigers and did not allow a hit in three innings.
Bob Elliott drove in the winning run in the first game and was the batting star of the second as the Boston Braves beat the Phils twice, 8-7 in 10 innings and 4-2.

Robinson Has Banner Day
The twin victory enabled the Braves to move into first place in the National League pennant race, a half game ahead of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who split with the Giants in New York.
Although Jackie Robinson enjoyed his best day as a major leaguer, the Dodgers could not get better than a split with the Giants. Brooklyn won the first, 4-3, and lost the second, 9-5. Robby drove in the tying run with a ninth inning single in the opener and scored the winning run on Vaughan's pinch single after he had stolen second. The Negro flash got four hits in five times at bat in the second game to extend his hitting streak to 16 consecutive games.
Cincinnati and St. Louis split a twin bill, the Reds winning the opener, 9-7, and the Cards coming back to bury Cincinnati, 17-2 in the second game. Slaughter, the Cards' star left fielder, drove in 20 runs, seven in the second game.
Higbe won his 100th major league game when he pitched the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 10-4 win over the Cubs in Chicago.

Chiefs Edge Out Crescents, 5-4, In 9th Inning Rally

Roseburg's Umpqua Chiefs pulled out a 5-4 win over South Oregon League's cellar-dwelling Crescent City in a ninth inning rally yesterday at Finlay Field before a capacity crowd.
With the score knotted, 4-4, at the last of the ninth and with one down, Dick DeBernardi, centerfielder, slammed the ball to centerfield for a double and raced home for the deciding run off third sacker Lovell Baker's clean single to left field.
Matson, second base, led off for Crescent City in the first with a single and went to second on Elmore Hill's error in left field. He scored during a beautiful recovery and putout between George Sanders and Bill Scherner at first.
The visitors added two markers and a double by Robinson, catcher, as Crescent City's huddle, Clasen, held the Chiefs hitless until the fifth.
In the fifth, the visitors connected for two hits and Matson scored, while during Roseburg's turn at the plate action opened up to start the Chiefs' winning rally.
Vonnie Baker got on off a single, George Sanders hit to advance Baker, who, in turn, stole third. DeBernardi's line drive scored Baker. Roy Long planted a ball into centerfield to fill the sacks and Sanders scored off Lovell Baker's trip to first by way of the Crescent City pitcher's misplay.
Crescent City accounted for single hits in the sixth and seventh, but failed to tally.
Chiefs Score in 8th
Roseburg scored in the eighth after two were down. Jerry Huggins rapped a double, V. Baker followed up with another double, scoring Huggins, and Baker came home off the leftfielder's error, knotting the count, 4-4.
A vain attempt to break the tie was made in the upper half of the ninth by Crescent City, but only one man reached first as Roy Long retired the side with two whiffs and a pop-up.
Matson, second-sacker, was a leading hitter for Crescent City with three for three. For the Chiefs, DeBernardi, V. Baker, and Huggins each got two for four, with all three getting a double.
Roy Long was hit by Crescent City seven times, gave up one walk and struck out 10 batters. Crescent City's Clasen allowed nine hits and struck out nine Chief batters.

Szasz Wins 7-Man Mat Tournament, Chance at Title

Being hurled through the ropes onto the floor only "heps" the victory endeavors of Al Szasz, St. Louis wrestler, instead of weakening them, according to the showing he made at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night in winning the trophy on a seven-man titular elimination card. After drawing the bye in the pairings for the first three matches, Szasz took on Stocky Knellson in the fifth bout and was tossed through the ropes onto the floor twice within 30 seconds. Then he came back to wear out the Tennessee hillbilly and gain the judges' decision at the end of the 15-minute brawl. In the sixth and final bout, Szasz disposed of Jack Kiser in 10:19 with a trip of whip lashes and a long arm bar, after Kiser had once slammed him through the ropes, and seemed to have him on the way out with shoulder butts and drop kicks.
Kiser had reached the final by first decisioning Buck Weaver in an orthodox affair in the card opener, then, in the fourth bout, out-battling Leon Karlenko, the Russian "mad dog," in one of the roughest frays ever seen on—and sometimes off—the local mat, keeping the nearly 700 spectators in a frenzy of excitement throughout the entire 15-minute period.
Other Results
Karlenko, in the second battle of the card, disposed of Jack Carter in 6:48 with a hammerlock and leg stamp, plus sundry other stuff characteristic of his sadistic technique. His assortment of caveman tactics was practically duplicated in the next bout by Knellson, who subdued Silent Rattan in 5:10. Rattan made a game effort to beat Knellson at the latter's own game, but he was unable to overcome the hillbilly's 15-pound weight advantage.
In addition to winning the trophy, the bronze statue of a wrestler, Szasz earned a crack at the Pacific Northwest junior heavyweight title held by Herb Parks. The combat will headline next Saturday night's program.
