Future Farmers Doing Big Business

SALEM, Ore., July 1.—(AP)—The 2,133 members of Oregon Future Farmers are running a big business, with \$476,907 invested in their farming operations, the State Department of Vocational Education said today.

Thirty of the 48 chapters own \$52,000 worth of farm machinery and equipment cooperatively, while 10 chapters manage a total of 253 acres in farms owned and operated by the chapters.

The FHA boys bought \$50,905 worth of victory bonds in the past 12 months, and canned 6,253 cans of food for relief. They also turned in 2,924 pounds of waste fat.

The boys canned 380,114 cans of food, raised 562 gardens totaling 330 acres, and 1,256 boys made their farm homes more beautiful.

The FFA members borrowed \$17,005 from their local banks. In their farm shop program, they built 1,725 pieces of farm machinery, and repaired 2,296 farm machines.

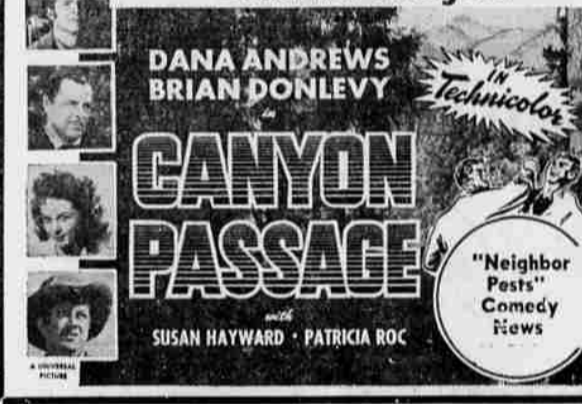
