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Shea, Yank Rookie, Bidding for Top Pitching Honors

 Rookie Right-hander Frank Shea of the New York Yankees, who not long ago was unofficially tabbed as the best freshman hurler of the major leagues, today challenged Bob Feller of Cleveland and Hal Newhouser of Detroit as well as his own teammate Spud Chandler for the designation as the number one pitcher of the American League.

Shea last night gained his 10th victory against only two defeats when he defeated the American League champion Red Sox in Boston, 3-1.

Shea, whose three shutout victories rank him behind only Feller and Walter Masterson of Washington in that department, has allowed more than three runs in a game only once. That was a 9-6 victory over the same Red Sox. His two defeats were by the narrowest of margins, a 1-0 loss to the Red Sox in which he allowed only three hits and a 3-2 defeat by the Chicago White Sox in 10 innings. Three times he has topped Newhouser in pitching duels.

Dobson, biggest winner on the Red Sox, was Shea's opposing moundman yesterday but a two-run triple by Joe DiMaggio in the first inning got Joe off on the wrong foot. The victory enabled the league leading Yankees to open up a five-and-a-half game bulge over the second place Sox.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, led by their new home run slugger Reese, their new outfielder Vaughan and their new cleanup clouter Furillo, downed the Phillies, 7-4, to move within two percentage points of the National League leading Boston Braves.

Reese, Vaughan and Furillo bagged three hits apiece, one of Reese's being his ninth home run.

Blackwell, Cincinnati's no-hit pitcher, recovered from a poor start to register his 11th straight and 13th victory of the season as his mates came from behind to defeat the Chicago Cubs in Cincinnati, 6-4.

The Chicago White Sox spotted Detroit a 5-0 lead in the second inning and then came on to defeat the Tigers, 6-5, on Apple's eighth inning home run off White.

Washington emerged the victor in a seesaw battle with the Philadelphia Athletics, winning 8-7 with a three-run cluster in the last of the ninth.

The scheduled game between Cleveland and the Browns at St. Louis was postponed by rain. New York, Boston, St. Louis and Pittsburgh in the National League were not scheduled.

New Sawmill To Rise at Reedsport

REEDSPORT — Charles Manschreck, one of the original promoters, builders and operators of the Bridge Lumber Co., which was recently acquired by the Gardner Lumber Co., announces that he will immediately com-
 mence the erection of another sawmill, on leased property just southwest of the Southern Pacific Railroad depot in Reedsport and on the banks of the Schofield River.

The new mill will be of 40,000 to 50,000 feet capacity daily on an eight-hour shift. It will be powered with two diesel motors because the Central Lincoln PUD has announced that it will be unable to furnish the electric energy to operate the new mill, due to the carrying capacity of their present power line and the lack of necessary transformers.

Manschreck will also construct a spur track to the mill from the present railroad siding and main line within the railroad yard. It is his plan to have the new mill in operation by Sept. 1.

Manschreck, since his separation from the Bridge Lumber Co., has been engaged in timber operations in this section and will continue in that business. He will supply logs for his new mill by his cutting operations in the Smith River district, using dumps on the river and towing the logs down Smith River, across the Umpqua, and into the Schofield, with a log pond on that stream at the mill site.
