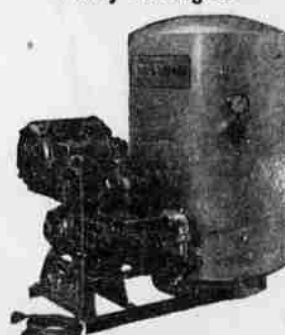

or size. This has nothing in common with normal cooperation between states.

"The Soviet government considers that the Anglo-French plan to set up a special organization for the coordination of the economies of European states would lead to interference in the internal affairs of European countries.

"The Soviet government rejects this plan as being altogether unsatisfactory and incapable of yielding any positive results."

Molotov assailed those parts of the British-French proposals which dealt with Germany as tending to take away the "justified reparations" claims of those allied countries which suffered from German aggression.

May Act Independently

The compromise under discussion was offered yesterday by Bidault in an effort to keep the conference alive. The conference was called after U. S. Secretary of State Marshall had suggested that European nations should agree among themselves on a plan for European reconstruction for which the United States would consider granting aid.

Before today's session—the fifth of the conference—convened both Britain and France reportedly were ready to go ahead with Marshall's suggestion in the event Russia rejected the compromise. Marshall made his proposal in a Harvard University speech June 5.

Bevin Fires Back
A French source said Bevin declared in a heated outburst that Molotov's statement was "a travesty of facts." The informant

quoted Bevin as continuing: "I don't know if he (Molotov) is repeating intentionally a false interpretation of things in the hope that people will finish by believing this erroneous interpretation."

"I regret the threats which have been pronounced with regard to the eventual consequence of our envisaged decision, but my country already has had the occasion to face up to such a situation and will continue to do so."

Fliers to Aid Law In
Curbing Drunken Airmen

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 2.—(AP)—Thursdon County Sheriff Frank Tamblin today swore in three fliers and the Olympia airport manager as deputies to help him handle reckless fliers and to aid in air search work.

The volunteer officers will receive air mileage pay while working as special officers.

Tamblin took the action following the recent conviction here of Edwin B. Henninger, 41, Seattle, on a drunken flying charge. Henninger finishes his 30-day sentence July 4.

Missing Flier's Body
Found in Ruins of Plane

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 2.—(AP)—A three-week search for a missing Dallas Texas, flier was over today, his body found beside a demolished airplane in the Blue Mountains.

He was Clarence P. Welton, 36, who took off from Boise, Idaho, June 10 on a flight to Spokane. Planes since had searched the entire route for him.

A sheepherder found the wreckage in timbered country six miles southeast of Tollgate.

Rampaging Mississippi
Sweeps Into Grand Tower

ST. LOUIS, July 2.—(AP)—The Mississippi River appeared to have reached its crest here today after smashing four main levees yesterday and routing thousands of persons from their homes in nearby Illinois communities.

While the worst of the flood appeared past for the St. Louis area, the situation southward as far as Cairo, Ill., remained critical.

A levee break in Jackson County, Ill., 100 miles south of here, flooded the town of Grand Tower and several unincorporated areas.

Walter Whitehead, county disaster chairman for the Red Cross, estimated 320 families fled their homes in Grand Tower and the

surrounding area and sold up to 40,000 acres of crops had been lost in the county.

6 Per Cent Limitation

OREGON CITY, July 2.—(AP)—Oregon City started its new fiscal year yesterday \$97 within the 6 per cent limitation.
