Cleveland Indians Sign Negro Flash, Doby, of Newark

CLEVELAND, O., July 3.—(AP)—The Cleveland Indians today were the first American League club to have a Negro player in the fold after signing Second Baseman Larry Doby, star Negro National League infielder bought from Newark, N. J., Eagles.

Tribe officials reported last night that Doby, a 22-year-old Navy veteran who leads the Negro National League in home runs and doubles, had been purchased from the Newark club for duty with the Indians starting Saturday. Terms of the purchase were not disclosed.

Jackie Robinson, capable first baseman of the Brooklyn Dodgers, was the first Negro signed to play in "organized" baseball in modern times. He advanced to the National League this season after one year on the Dodgers' International League farm club, the Montreal Royals.

Doby, who has slammed 13 homers, 16 doubles and eight triples while compiling a .458 batting average with Newark this season, returned from three years' Navy service last year to park the Eagles to the Negro National League championship. Newark then defeated the Kansas City Monarchs in the Negro World Series.

"The acquisition of Larry Doby is a routine baseball purchase—in my mind," Boudreau declared.

"Creed, race or color are not factors in baseball success, whether it be in the major or minor leagues," Lou Continued.

"Ability and character are the only factors."

"Doby will be given every chance, as will any other deserving recruit, to prove that he has the ability to make good with us."

Brooklyn Battles Its Way to Top of National League

Leave it to Brooklyn to do the incredible. The Dodgers today are on top of the National League. Yet, by all the laws of nature and baseball they should be in the second division. For on paper they are no more than that.

The lineup is far from impressive.

Yet this club with only two .300 hitters, without the services of Reiser, their best Newyer, and with only one dependable pitcher, Branca, is leading the league by one game.

The Brooks borrowed a page from the Giants' book last night, falling on three Giants pitchers

for nine runs in the fourth inning and went on to a handy 11-3 victory.

Branca, Brooklyn's biggest winner and all-star selection, won his 11th game with a seven-hitter and fanned 10. The win enabled the Dodgers to take a one game lead over the Boston Braves. The Hubmen dropped a 6-5 decision to the Phillies.

Scoring eight runs in a wild fifth inning, the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Pirates in Pittsburgh, 8-6, as a crowd of 23,384 watched five Pittsburgh pitchers make a futile attempt to stop the Reds.

Yankees Stretch Lead

The New York Yankees opened up a six-and-a-half game lead in the American League by drubbing the Washington Senators, 8-1. Reynolds held the Nats to five hits including Spence's ninth home run which robbed him of a shutout. It was his seventh victory. Joe DiMaggio walked his 10th home run for the Yanks.

Scoring a run in the ninth inning the Philadelphia Athletics defeated the Red Sox at Boston 7-6 to take over undisputed possession of fourth place.

Throttling a late rally, New-houser, Detroit's southpaw, gained his ninth win against eight losses as he pitched the Detroit Tigers to a 6-5 win over the Indians. The win put the Tigers into a second place tie with the Red Sox.

Helped by homers by Judnick and Heath, Kramer had an easy time in pitching the Browns to a 7-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

The St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs were idle.
