MRS. S. A. WARG ATTENDS MEETING OF BOARD OF MANAGERS

Mrs. S. A. Warg, president of the Douglas County Council of P.T.A., attended the board of managers of the Oregon Congress of P.T.A., Thursday and Friday in Portland.

On the agenda were reports of various committees among which was a report on the tuition scholarship fund by Mrs. Dean Walker, of Independence, who stated that a great many scholarships were given this spring to help young men and women taking teachers training in Oregon colleges and colleges of education. A number of P.T.A.'s have sponsored a full scholarship of \$74 for the full year's tuition, which in most cases is renewable for four years. The Douglas County P.T.A. Council has submitted the name of one student to this committee.

Mrs. Frederick Young, state chairman of legislation, spoke on the national bill No. 472, which is the federal aid bill to education, sponsored by the Oregon Congress of P.T.A. She also spoke on the federal aid bill for school lunches.

On the national defense question, the board of managers of the Oregon Congress of P.T.A. adopted the same statement as the National Congress of P.T.A. adopted and which read as follows: "June 5, 1947, we believe that in the period of international tension, as we work diligently for permanent peace, our nation should maintain a military force capable of going into action in defense of the nation or in fulfillment of our international commitments. We urge a broad program of scientific development and technological application, a co-ordinated intelligence service, a strong up-to-the-minute air force, a strong navy and adequate army composed of fully trained, fully equipped men. We urge these rather than a universal military training, which at best could do no more than produce an unmobilized mass of half-trained boys. We consider a program of universal military training to be unjustifiable for purely educational purposes, an obstacle to world understanding and world peace, an inadequate provision for defending the nation under the conditions of modern warfare."

Following the ceremony, a reception was held at Alpha Chi Omega sorority house. After the bride and bridegroom had cut the cake in the traditional manner, it was cut and served by Miss Dorothy Baird. Presiding at the punch service was Mrs. F. F. Finnegan, Alpha Chi Omega housemother. The United States National Bank, in its report to the Comptroller of the Currency as of June 30, 1947, according to announcement by P. L. Metschan, manager of the Roseburg branch, lists loans and discounts amounting to a record-breaking \$113,214,501.74. This figure represents a gain of \$30,226,334.63 over the corresponding call date in 1946 and a gain of \$1,388,306.20 over the December 31, 1946 call.

The current statement shows total resources of \$546,423,408.06 and deposits of \$516,438,710.24.
