Woman Charged With Forging 21 Govt. Checks

SEATTLE, July 5. — (AP) —

Laurence E. Albert, supervising agent of the U. S. secret service here, has announced the arrest in Juneau, Alaska, of Mrs. Walter A. Kross on a warrant charging she forged and passed 21 government allowance checks totaling \$1,612.

Albert said she cashed checks made out to her foster daughter, Alice Jones, wife of a soldier serving overseas when the checks were cashed.

The foster daughter did not know of the checks until she met her husband in California on his return in 1945.

Albert added that Mrs. Kross cashed the checks in Washington and Oregon and during the period of the forgeries lived in Vancouver, Everett and Seattle. She probably will be taken to Tacoma for prosecution.
