

Brooklyn Looks Like Flag Winner In National Loop

Brooklyn will meet the New York Yankees in the World Series according to the pleasant myth that accepts the July 4th evening standings as an infallible guide of things to come.

Myth is the word for it as far as the National League is concerned for only four times in the last 10 years has it worked out that way.

This is the sixth time in the last eight years that the Dodgers have been leading the parade at this stage. The 1941 pennant is the only flag that has waved over Flatbush since 1920.

American League clubs have been more consistent. The last six July 4 leaders have clicked home first in September and nine of the last 10, counting 1938 when the Yankees, the eventual winners, were tied with Cleveland.

A pair of Dodger wins over New York were necessary to keep Brooklyn in first place up to this very hour because Boston, crowding close, won a pair from the faltering Phillies moving to within one game of the top.

Robinson's Streak Halted
Brooklyn piled up a 16-7 edge over the Giants in the morning game.

Harry Taylor squeezed home past Mort Cooper in the afternoon tilt, 4-3, on Hermanski's pinch single following Jorgenson's double in the ninth. Cooper enlivened the proceedings by smashing a homer, the Giants' 35th in 15 consecutive games for a new league record. He also stopped Jackie Robinson's hitting streak at 21 games.

Sain hurled the Braves to an opening 10-3 nod over the Phils for his 10th victory and Lanfranconi, dragged out of the bull pen for his first complete game, responded with a four-hitter, 7-1.

The St. Louis Cards continued to play inconsistently, shutting out Chicago, 7-0, on Munger's three-hitter, but then blowing the second, 5-4, to remain deadlocked with the Cubs for fourth.

Blackwell Blanks Pirates
Cincinnati, which might become a surprise factor in the race, continued to move with a double win over Pittsburgh, 8-0, behind Blackwell and 6-4 behind Reliefer Gumbert. It was the 14th win for Blackwell and his 12th in succession.

The Yankees ran their win streak to five by downing Washington twice, 7-3 and 4-2.

Boston finally shook off the Philadelphia A's after dropping the first game to the Mackmen, 8-6, in 12 innings, the sixth straight loss to that club. In the second tilt, Hughson turned in an impressive three-hit, 4-0 shut-out.

Detroit took a 13-6 wallop from Cleveland and then just managed to hold on for a 4-4 tie in the second game, called by agreement at the end of the ninth.

The last-place St. Louis Browns thumped Chicago, 10-2, after losing the opener, 6-3, with Heath's hitting featuring both games. Big Jeff made five hits and drove in seven runs. His two homers, one with the bases full, were his 12th and 13th of the year.

Roseburg's Umpqua Chiefs fell to a fast-working Central Point club, 4-1, yesterday afternoon at Finlay Field. It was the Chiefs' second defeat in six Southern Oregon league starts and gave the Pointers a 3-and-3 standing.

Errors proved costly to the Chiefs as Central Point scored only one earned run and Roseburg misplayed six times.

Pitcher Bruce Hamilton struck out 11 Central Point batters, walked two, and allowed four hits to out-perform Wilkinson, who whiffed six Chiefs, gave 3 gift trips to first and was hit four times.

Central Point ran in two counters in the opening frame as they immediately loaded the sacks on three Roseburg errors.

Bill Schermer stretched a line drive into a double but was left on as the side retired in the Chiefs' first canto.

The second frame was Roseburg's as Yonnie Baker led off with a triple, Virg Sanders walked and DeBernardi sent Baker home for the Chiefs' only score of the day, on a Central Point muff.

The visitors distributed their next two runs in the eighth and ninth frames, filling the sacks, and walked one in the eighth; and scored off Pitcher Wilkinson's three-bagger.

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Riot Marks Ball Game Between Seals and Angels

"Was the Fourth of July and all up and down the Pacific Coast League baseball circuit comparative calm prevailed, but in San Francisco 19,639 fans got a bit of unscheduled fireworks that blew the second game of a double-header dangerously near to forfeiture.

The melee, marked by fist fights, cushion-throwing and an attack by a fan on an umpire, started in the fourth inning. After Umpire Jack Powell ordered Bill Kelley, manager of the Los Angeles Angels, out of the park, a fan got into a scuffle with the umpire, but players parted them.

In the sixth, Powell ousted Outfielder Eddie Sauer from the game and such a barrage of cushions descended onto the field that forfeiture of the game was threatened.

In the last inning, more cushions were thrown and the game was held up for five minutes. Then, after the last out was made, fans poured onto the field and fistfights broke out. San Francisco Coach Del Young rushed to Umpire Powell's rescue after the latter complained he was attacked from the rear.

San Francisco and Los Angeles split the doubleheader, the Seals winning the opener, 3 to 2, and the Angels copping the nightcap, 4 to 2. In the first, Brewer pitched the Seals to within a game of the league-leading Angels but 15 well-placed hits spelled victory for the Angels in the riotous nightcap.
